<u>Recommendation 1</u>. That the State Regent's project, "A Legacy of Liberty," be approved. <u>Adopted</u>.

Recommendation 2. That KSDAR establish an Investment Committee as an administrative committee, to be comprised of three members appointed by the State Regent and whose oversight shall be the Executive Committee. The KSDAR Investment Committee shall define investment objectives for approval by the Executive Committee and execute strategies toward achieving those objectives. No member shall serve more than two consecutive terms. Adopted.

<u>Recommendation 3</u>. That advertisements for the State Conference Program Book be \$50.00 for a full page and \$35.00 for a half page, be adopted. <u>Adopted</u>.

<u>Recommendation 4</u>. That the Judd Smith Brooks Scholarship be funded at \$1000.00 and paid by the Judd Brooks Scholarship Fund. <u>Adopted</u>.

<u>Recommendation 5</u>. That the cost of one meal for each page and up to one sleeping room for the State September Meeting be paid from the Page Patron Fund if funds are available, be adopted. <u>Adopted</u>.

<u>Recommendation 6</u>. That the registration fee for pages at this State September Meeting be waived. <u>Adopted</u>.

<u>Recommendation 7</u>. That the 2023 Kansas DAR Scholarship be funded at \$1,500.00, and the 2023 Good Citizen Scholarship be funded at \$750.00 for each male and female student, for a total of \$1500. <u>Adopted</u>.

<u>Recommendation 8</u>. That the facility and other expenses of the Kansas Society State September Meeting shall be paid from the General Fund. <u>Adopted</u>.

<u>Recommendation 9.</u> That the 2023 Elizabeth M. Hill Kessler Scholarship be funded at \$930.00 plus interest. <u>Adopted.</u>

<u>Recommendation 10</u>. That the 2023 Gladys E. Routh Scholarship be funded at \$1,055.00 plus interest. <u>Adopted</u>.

<u>Recommendation 11</u>. That KSDAR purchase Adobe Acrobat Pro application software to create and manage documents for a cost of 60 dollars. <u>Adopted</u>.

<u>Recommendation 12</u>. That a check scanner be purchased for \$350 with a monthly service fee of \$40 to be used by the State Treasurer to deposit checks. <u>Adopted</u>.

<u>Recommendation 13</u>. That \$200 be budgeted per administration for the State Marshal Committee expenses. <u>Adopted</u>.

#### Preamble to the Constitution of the United States of America

We the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect Union, establish justice, ensure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

#### **2023 State Conference Standing Rules**

- 1. All members shall be registered before entering the business meetings. Proper identification badges shall be worn at all meetings.
- 2. All meetings shall begin at the hour announced.
- 3. Any business unfinished at the time of recess shall be resumed at the next business session.
- 4. To reduce disruption, attendees are asked to remain seated during reports unless otherwise instructed. Doors will be opened briefly at the instruction of the State Regent to allow for entry and exit.
- 5. Only registered delegates and other voting members of the State Conference shall be entitled to make motions, debate, and vote. State Committee Chairs and District Directors who are not elected delegates shall have the privilege to speak without vote.
- 6. All main motions shall be written and signed by the maker and seconded and sent to the Recording Secretary before action is taken. The maker of the motion shall rise and state her name and that of her chapter.

- 7. No member shall speak in debate more than once to the same question on the same day or longer than two minutes any time, except by the consent of the assembly.
- 8. Members who appear on the program or who are making reports shall occupy the front seats. Accredited delegates to the State Conference shall occupy seats together at the front of the room at all business meetings.
- 9. Only the chair is to be addressed in making reports.
- 10. Two timekeepers shall be appointed by the chair. Reports of State Officers and District Directors shall be limited to three minutes and two minutes for State Committee Chairs and Chapter Regents.
- 11. Announcements must be submitted in advance in writing to the State Meetings Chair who will approve and read them.
- 12. A copy of every report for the printed Proceedings of the State Conference shall be submitted, ready for printing and sent to the State Recording before the report is read at the Conference.
- 13. If a member is not present, her report shall not be read unless previously submitted as a recording and her report shall be filed for printing in the official Proceedings of the State Conference.
- 14. Any Chair or individual having a table display or exhibit shall attend to the removal of all material at the close of the Conference.
- 15. All necessary communications shall be delivered by the Pages.
- 16. Members shall have cell phones turned off or on vibrating ringer during business sessions, meals, and programs. Any cell phone disruptions shall be charged a \$5 penalty.
- 17. Registration shall close at 3:00 pm, Saturday, April 15, 2023.
- 18. The current edition of Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, shall govern the Conference, except when inconsistent with the State Bylaws, the Bylaws of the National Society, or the adopted Conference Standing Rules.
- 19. Credentials will close 30 minutes prior to reporting.

#### Addendum

To facilitate the presentation process, the proposed amendments to the KSDAR Bylaws will be presented "in gross". This means the assembly will hear a summary of each proposed amendment, a review of the rationale and effect of adoption of each amendment, Then, the voting assembly will be allowed to extract articles (with the exception of proposed conforming amendment #2) over which they wish to pursue discussion and /or further amendment. Next, the voting assembly will, without discussion, vote once on adoption of the remainder amendments after which the extracted amendments will be presented in full and voted on independently.



Chair Kristi Kocher reported, and appreciation was expressed to the members of the Finance Committee, Denise Bullock, Rebecca Spaulding, Tena Brucken, and Earlene Sells.

Mrs. Brucken presented the Financial Position, Statement of Activity and proposed 2023 budget. She moved the proposed budget for adoption. <u>Adopted.</u>

Cindy Henry, Chair of the Audit Committee presented their report and moved for adoption. <u>Adopted.</u>

Mrs. Henry introduced the members of the Audit Committee: Cathy Grassl, and Mary Jo Jurey.

Bylaws Committee Chair Janelle DeFrees reported that the proposed bylaw amendments were sent in accordance with Article XI Committees, Section 3 Bylaws Committee; a webinar was provided, an electronic copy was provided to each delegate, and they are projected on the overhead screen.

Mrs. DeFrees moved the adoption of the following amendments together except for those for which voting members have asked for a separate vote per a consent agenda.

On behalf of the Bylaws Committee, I move the adoption of the following amendments together except for those for which voting members have asked for a separate vote: The first six amendments are regarding Committees: four are about duties and, two regard creating a committee.

Proposed Amendment #12: Article XI, Committees, Section 3. Bylaws Committee. Amend by striking shall and inserting may after "The committee" and before "have", by inserting: The Bylaws Committee shall forward prepared bylaws amendment proposals to the executive committee as requested for review. Prepared bylaws amendment proposals shall be submitted to the executive committee for final review no later than sixty (60) days prior to State Conference by striking sent and adding distributed by the State Corresponding Secretary after "shall be" and by adding The bylaws committee shall

review the state bylaws for compliance with NSDAR bylaws and maintain updates of amendments from the National and State level. The bylaws committee may be authorized to correct article and section designations, punctuation, and cross-references and to make other such technical and conforming changes as may be necessary but do not alter meaning or the intent of the society.

The proposed amendment includes two grammatical corrections and added duties of maintaining the KSDAR Bylaws. It also clarifies whose duty it is to distribute proposed bylaws amendments for notice. Adopted.

Proposed Amendment #11: Article XI, Committees, Section 4. Credentials Committee, Paragraph 2 Amend by inserting electronically, or after "each year" and before "showing."

The proposed amendment inserts "electronically" in order to help facilitate needed communication. <u>Adopted.</u>

Proposed Amendment #10: Article X, Executive Committee, Section 4. Duties Item: Second paragraph. Amend by substitution.

The proposed amendment rewords the current bylaw using most of the same words. Adopted.

Proposed Amendment #19: Article VI, Nominations and Elections, Section 2. Nominating Committee Item (b) Duties Paragraphs 1, 2, and 3. The proposed amendments are substitutions for paragraphs 1, 2, and 3. Paragraph 1: by substituting: No later than seven days after the nominating committee is elected, the chair of the nominating committee shall notify by e-mail to all chapter regents of the impending election and shall indicate the final date on which the names of members who consent to be considered for state offices shall be received from the chapters. The notice shall also appear in the first regularly published issue of the Cyber Sunflower immediately following the announcement.

clarifies timeline, details the nominating committee chair's duty to send notices of state elections and states the notice shall be published in the Cyber Sunflower.

Paragraph 2: by substituting: The committee shall select one nominee for each office. In its selection of candidates, the committee shall endeavor to represent each of the four Districts. A chapter may endorse more than one member for office. However, no chapter shall have more than one member serving as a State Officer at a time.

Any member desiring to be considered by the nominating committee for election to a state office must provide a fully executed chapter endorsement form, signed by the Chapter Regent and the Chapter Recording Secretary, and received by the chair of the nominating committee no later than December 15.

clarifies timeline and chapter parameters on endorsements.

**Paragraph 3**: by substituting: By January 15, the report of the Nominating Committee shall be sent to the State Officers, the Honorary State Regents, the State Reporter, and the Chapter Regents. The report of the Nominating Committee shall be presented at the State Conference. The same report shall appear in the first regularly published issue of the Cyber Sunflower immediately following the January 15th date.

Nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the floor nominee has been obtained and the nominee has the fully executed chapter endorsement form signed by the chapter regent and the chapter recording secretary ready for submission.

requires the state nominating committee's report to be published in the Cyber Sunflower and better clarifies requirements concerning making nominations from the floor. <u>Adopted.</u>

Kimberly Patrick, Olathe Chapter, requested the extraction of Amendment #19, paragraph 3.

Proposed Amendment #13: Article XI, Committees, Section 6. Investment Committee. Amend by creating: a) The KSDAR Investment Committee shall be a standing, administrative committee, comprised of three members appointed by the State Regent, at least one of whom shall be a member of the Finance Committee and whose oversight shall be the Executive Committee.

b) The KSDAR Investment Committee shall define investment objectives for approval by the Executive Committee and execute

strategies toward achieving those objectives. No member shall serve more than two consecutive terms.

The proposed amendment is to create an Investment Committee as an administrative committee of three members appointed by the State Regent with oversight by the Executive Committee. <u>Adopted.</u>

Proposed Amendment #14 Article XI, Committees Section 1. Standing Committees. Amend by inserting Investment after "Finance" and before "Kansas DAR"

The proposed amendment is to insert Investment into the list of standing committees outlined in the KSDAR Bylaws. <u>Adopted.</u>

All amendments adopted by two-thirds in the affirmative except those extracted at the request of a voting member.

Proposed Amendment #6: Article VII, Duties of Officers, Section 5. State Recording Secretary, Item a., paragraph v. Amend by striking file.

The proposed amendment is a simple grammatical correction, striking a single misplaced word. <u>Adopted.</u>

Proposed Amendment #5: Article VII, Duties of Officers, Section 2. State Regent, Paragraphs 2, 3 and 6. Amend paragraph 2 by adding: She shall ensure compliance with NSDAR rulings in accordance with NSDAR Bylaw Article XV, States, Section 10. paragraph 3 by inserting: sign checks and authorizations for checks drawn after "shall" and before "cosign", by striking cosign all checks drawn, by striking September Meeting and inserting Fall Forum and by striking and shall approve the arrangements, contract and payments made by the State Conference Chair and the State Conference Committees. Amend paragraph 6 by striking.

Proposed amendments: clarify the State Regent's duty to oversee compliance with NSDAR rulings, refines her check signing duties, eliminates her duty to approve arrangements made by the State Conference chair and eliminates filings with the insurance company about archival content. Adopted.

Proposed Amendment #7: Article VII, Duties of Officers, Section 6. State Corresponding Secretary, Paragraph 3. Amend by striking and the Executive Committee and inserting: She shall send previous notice of proposed bylaws amendments to all chapter regents, voters, delegates, and alternates and post to the members' website no later than thirty (30) days before the state conference.

Proposed amendments eliminate the State Corresponding Secretary's duty to send notices of Executive Committee meetings and details the added duty of sending proposed bylaws amendments out for notice. Adopted.

Proposed Amendment #8: Article VII, Duties of Officers, Section 8. State Treasurer, Paragraph 9. Amend by inserting Assistant Treasurer, the State Meetings Treasurer after "officers" and before "in".

Proposed amendment specifies who should be bonded along with the State Treasurer. <u>Adopted.</u>

Proposed Amendment #9: Article VII, Duties of Officers, Section 10. State Historian, Paragraph 3. Amend by striking a copy and inserting two copies after "obtain" and before "of".

Proposed amendment changes from one copy to two copies of the AR&P that the State Historian shall obtain to be placed in the KSDAR Archives. <u>Adopted.</u>

Proposed Amendment #4: Article XIII Chapters, Section 5. Chapter Regent, Paragraph 1. Amend by substituting Annually, before September 1, each Chapter Regent shall send to the State Vice Regent a listing of names and e-mail addresses of her chapter's chairs of national and committees.

The proposed amendment redefines the timeline for chapter regents to submit their list of contact information for chapter chairs of national and state committees to the State Vice-Regent. <u>Adopted.</u>

All amendments adopted by two-thirds in the affirmative except those extracted at the request of a voting member.

Proposed Amendment #22: Article V, Officers Section 2. Eligibility, paragraph 1. Amend by adding: Any member seeking to serve as a State officer shall be a member in good standing and from a Chapter in good standing, not in violation of NSDAR or KSDAR bylaws. (see Article XIII, Chapters, Section 1. Officers, paragraphs 2 and 3.)

This proposed amendment adds that to be eligible to hold the office of State Regent of State Vice Regent, a member must be in good standing and from a chapter in good standing, meaning not in violation of NSDAR or KSDAR Bylaws. Adopted.

Proposed Amendment #16: Article XII, Districts, Section 4. Officers. Amend by adding To be eligible to serve as a District Director, a member must have been a member in good standing in her District for a minimum of five years, and from a Chapter in good standing, not in violation of NSDAR or State bylaws (see Article XIII, Chapters, Section 1. Officers, paragraphs 2). She shall also have served as a chapter regent. To be eligible to serve as one of the other officers, by the same good-standing standards, a member must have served as a chapter officer.

This proposed amendment adds that to be eligible to serve as a District Director a member must be in good standing in her District for a minimum of five years and from a chapter in good standing, not in violation of NSDAR or KSDAR bylaws. It also adds that she shall have served as a chapter regent. In order for a member to serve as one of the other District Officers, by the same good standing she shall have served as a chapter officer.

Proposed Amendment#17: Article VI, Nominations and Elections, Section 2. Nominating Committee Item (a) Members. Amend by striking the and inserting each after "of" and before "administration", and by adding In order to be eligible to serve as District representative on the committee, the member must have held membership in the District for minimum of five years or have served a full term as a District officer in the District and be a member in good standing and from a Chapter of the Kansas Society in good standing and not in violation of NSDAR or State Bylaws. (see Article XIII, Chapters, Section 1. Officers, paragraphs 2 and 3.)

The proposed amendment adds that to be eligible to serve as a District representative on the Nominating Committee a member must have held membership in the District for minimum of five years or have served a full term as a District officer in the District and be a member in good standing and from a Chapter of the Kansas Society in good standing and not in violation of NSDAR or State Bylaws

Carol Crane, Sagamore Chapter, requested the extraction of Amendment #5, Nancy Machnicki, General Edward Hand Chapter, requested the extraction of Amendment #16 and Colleen Anderson, Council Oak Chapter, requested the extraction of Amendment #17.

All amendments adopted by two-thirds in the affirmative except those extracted at the request of a voting member.

Proposed Amendment #20: Article XIV, Compliance, Section 1. Members, Section 2. Chapters. Amend bylaws by creating Article XIV, Compliance, to be placed before current Article XIV, Parliamentary Authority, then renumbering subsequent Articles.

This proposed amendment is created because compliance with NSDAR bylaws is an NSDAR requirement. <u>Adopted.</u>

Proposed Amendment #21: Article IX, State Board of Management Section 5. Duties. Amend by adding: It shall assist the State Regent in ensuring compliance with NSDAR rulings in accordance with Article XV, States, Section 10.

This proposed amendment clarifies that the State Board of Management is responsible, along with the State Regent, for ensuring compliance with NSDAR rulings. <u>Adopted.</u>

All amendments adopted by two-thirds in the affirmative except those extracted at the request of a voting member.

Proposed Amendment #1: Article IV. Fees and Dues, Section 3. Additional Payments, Item b. Amend by striking.

This proposed amendment strikes the paragraph stating money shall be set aside for payment of the insurance costs for the Kansas Archives. <u>Adopted.</u>

Proposed Amendment #18: Article VI, Nominations and Elections Section 1. A. Amend by creating section 1a) Nominations. During an election year for KSDAR state officers the call for chapters to consider proposing nominations to state office shall be published in the September issue of the Cyber Sunflower.

This proposed amendment creates a paragraph stating that during an election year for KSDAR state officers, announcements and the call for nominations will be published in the Cyber Sunflower. <u>Adopted.</u>

Proposed Amendment #24: Article XV, Amendments of Bylaws Section 1. Notice. Amend by inserting in good standing and not in violation of NSDAR or State Bylaws. (see Article XIII, Chapters, Section 1. Officers, paragraphs 2 and 3.) after Kansas Society. and by striking An amendment proposed by a chapter shall be endorsed by at least one other chapter in the Kansas Society.

This amendment clarifies the requirements for a chapter to submit KSDAR bylaw amendment proposals by adding a compliance clause and eliminating the requirement that a second chapter endorses any proposed bylaw amendment submission. Adopted.

All amendments adopted by two-thirds in the affirmative except those extracted at the request of a voting member.

Proposed Amendment #2: State September Meeting. Amend, as a conforming amendment, by striking State September Meeting and inserting Fall Forum wherever it occurs in the KSDAR Bylaws.

This proposed amendment is a conforming amendment striking all places in the KSDAR Bylaws that say State September Meeting and replace it with Fall Forum. This amendment cannot be extracted. Adopted.

Proposed Amendment #3: Article VIII, Meetings, Section 7. State September Meeting. Amend by striking The meetings held in the

month of September The meetings held in the month of September shall be known as the State September Meeting. and by striking allotted and inserting paid after "shall be" and before "from".

This amendment conforms to Amendment #2 and includes a grammatical correction exchanging allotted for paid. Adopted.

Proposed Amendment #15: Article XII Districts Section 3. Meetings Item (a). Amend by striking by October 1. and inserting within one week after the conclusion of the Fall Forum.

This proposed amendment redefines the date by which the State Nominating Committee election results shall be submitted to the State Recording Secretary. <u>Adopted.</u>

Proposed Amendment #23: Article VIII, Meetings, Section 3. Qualifications, paragraph 1. Amend by striking and after December 1 and inserting a comma and by adding and it is not in violation of NSDAR or KSDAR bylaws.

This clarifies chapter requirements for representation at State Conference includes being in good standing and not in violation of NSDAR or KSDAR bylaws. <u>Adopted.</u>

All amendments adopted by two-thirds in the affirmative except those extracted at the request of a voting member.

Proposed Amendment #1: Standing Rule Number 1. Amend paragraph 2 by adding: She shall ensure compliance with NSDAR rulings in accordance with NSDAR Bylaw Article XV, States, Section 10. paragraph 3 by inserting: sign checks and authorizations for checks drawn after "shall" and before "cosign", by striking cosign all checks drawn, by striking September Meeting and inserting Fall Forum and by striking and shall approve the arrangements, contract and payments made by the State Conference Chair and the State Conference Committees. Amend paragraph 6 by striking.

Proposed amendments: clarify the State Regent's duty to oversee compliance with NSDAR rulings, refines her check signing duties, eliminates her duty to approve arrangements made by the State Conference chair and eliminates filings with the insurance company about archival content,

Carol Crane, Sagamore Chapter, moved to insert in paragraph 2, "KSDAR Bylaws" after "with" and before "NSDAR." Seconded. Adopted by two-thirds in the affirmative.

# Janelle DeFrees moved the adoption of Amendment 16.

Proposed Amendment #16: Article XII, Districts, Section 4. Officers. Amend by adding To be eligible to serve as a District Director, a member must have been a member in good standing in her District for a minimum of five years, and from a Chapter in good standing, not in violation of NSDAR or State bylaws (see Article XIII, Chapters, Section 1. Officers, paragraphs 2). She shall also have served as a chapter regent. To be eligible to serve as one of the other officers, by the same good-standing standards, a member must have served as a chapter officer.

This proposed amendment adds that to be eligible to serve as a District Director a member must be in good standing in her District for a minimum of five years and from a chapter in good standing, not in violation of NSDAR or KSDAR bylaws. It also adds that she shall have served as a chapter regent. In order for a member to serve as one of the other District Officers, by the same good standing she shall have served as a chapter officer.

Nancy Machnicki, General Edward Hand chapter, moved that Amendment #16 be sent back to committee. Seconded. Referred to committee.

# Janelle DeFrees moved the adoption of Amendment 17.

Proposed Amendment#17: Article VI, Nominations and Elections, Section 2. Nominating Committee Item (a) Members. Amend by striking the and inserting each after "of" and before "administration", and by adding In order to be eligible to serve as District representative on the committee, the member must have held membership in the District for minimum of five years or have served a full term as a District officer in the District and be a member in good standing and from a Chapter of the Kansas Society in good standing and not in violation of NSDAR or State Bylaws. (see Article XIII, Chapters, Section 1. Officers, paragraphs 2 and 3.)

The proposed amendment adds that to be eligible to serve as a District representative on the Nominating Committee a member must have held membership in the District for minimum of five years or have served a full term as a District officer in the District and be a member in good standing and from a Chapter of the Kansas Society in good standing and not in violation of NSDAR or State Bylaws

Colleen Anderson, Council Oak chapter, moved to refer Amendment #17 back to committee. Seconded. Referred to committee.

# Janelle DeFrees moved the adoption of Amendment 19.

Proposed Amendment #19: Article VI, Nominations and Elections, Section 2. Nominating Committee Item (b) Duties Paragraphs 1, 2 and 3. Paragraph 3. by substituting: By January 15, the report of the

Nominating Committee shall be sent to the State Officers, the Honorary State Regents, the State Reporter, and the Chapter Regents. The report of the Nominating Committee shall be presented at the State Conference. The same report shall appear in the first regularly published issue of the Cyber Sunflower immediately following the January 15th date.

Nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the floor nominee has been obtained and the nominee has the fully executed chapter endorsement form signed by the chapter regent and the chapter recording secretary ready for submission.

Requires the state nominating committee's report to be published in the Cyber Sunflower and better clarifies requirements concerning making nominations from the floor.

## State Regent Rebecca Kline

Your State Regent began the *Legacy of Liberty* term July 3, 2022, and it has been full speed ahead ever since. She was privileged to participate in the National July 4 parade in Washington, D.C. after Continental Congress with more than twenty Kansas daughters.

Educational workshops specifically designed for regents, registrars, and treasurers led by state officers and state chairs were held in each corner of the state with a large amount of participation from chapters that ordinarily do not participate in state meetings. Orientation Zoom meetings reached the District Directors, and State Chairs to begin their leadership roles.

A full day was spent with the State Historian performing an inventory and organizing the state archives in Wichita. The first event for the National Day of Prayer was held in Overland Park, in October, led by the State Chaplain with more than thirty guests in attendance. We hope this event can expand to all districts. The State Regent has celebrated significant chapter anniversaries: with Mary Wade Strother, 100 years; Martha Loving Ferrell, 85 years, and William Wilson of 75 years. To her dismay, she was unable to celebrate with the John and Hattie Possum Chapter for their 10<sup>th</sup>, and the Esther Lowrey Chapter for 115 years.

The District Directors in the western half of the state collaborated with the State Regent in setting up chapter visits. To this day, there are only a few chapters left to visit in the Southwest District then visits will begin in the Eastern half of the state in the Fall. She is grateful for the flexibility of the chapters to accommodate this schedule to decrease gas mileage and driving times. The hospitality and courtesies shown to her are immeasurable, for which she greatly appreciates. She has enjoyed visiting members she does not normally meet at state meetings, and the delicious food all around the west. A full report of activities will be published in the AR&P.

A highlight of the Fall season was to celebrate the partnership with the Wichita Advanced Learning Library at the reception celebration for the housing of our state archives and more than 5000 donated books and periodicals. She traveled to Washington, D.C. for the National Board of Management in October, and a full week schedule of educational opportunities with national officers, national chairs, and professional speakers, then again, in February for her third board. The high point was being able to visit the National Archives and being shown John Phillip Sousa's music score of Stars and Stripes.

The State Regent's project team has found creative items to raise funds for the project. The first Liberty Grant will be awarded in support of the Robert J. Dole VA Behavioral Health Services program for PTSD, a program for Veterans. It is a privilege to assist the men and women with their mental health needs.

The Kansas Website has been updated with multiple tabs for easier searching, and a Members Resource tab was created for immediate information.

The Torch team, a focused group of state officers and state chairs, was formalized to connect with struggling or at-risk chapters. Those in need of extra assistance with leadership, and membership expansion are assisted with a chapter visit from one or more state officers, state chairs,

and volunteer genealogists. This process has proven to be valuable in establishing a stronger connection with chapter members.

Serving with exceptionally talented and skilled state officers, district directors, state chairs and chapter regents has supported this officer in accomplishing the goals of the Legacy of Liberty administration. She is extremely appreciative of the opportunity to serve the Kansas Daughters.

With the assistance of the District representatives on the Historical Markers and Archives Committee, 13 previously placed chapter markers that were not included in the KSDAR Historic Markers Directory have now been added to this database, along with 17 updated marker assessments. Over 35 entries have been added to the KSDAR

master list of Daughters with DAR Insignia marked graves. The information of three Daughters, interred in Kansas but members of out-of-state chapters, was shared with their respective State Historians. The KSDAR Outstanding Teacher of American History for 2023 is Blanche Adelle Hartley Wulfekoetter, sponsored by her Four Winds Chapter. Ms. Wulfekoetter's application has been forwarded for national-level competition. Fifteen chapters were given state certificate recognition for reported activities involving honoring their Patriots, preservation of chapter records, reassessment, maintenance and/or placement of historical markers, and holding events and activities that paid homage to the Santa Fe Trail and the Madonna of the Trail. This officer is honored to continue to serve Kansas Daughters and the Kline Administration.

State Librarian Connie Becker

This officer served as a delegate to the 131st Continental Congress and a member of the Corridor Hostess Committee. She has attended all executive board meetings and the State September meeting. America 250! Melanie Horton

This Chair is proud of the efforts of the Kansas Society chapters in preparing for and promoting America 250! in their communities, on social media, and in specific meeting activities and service projects. This Chair commends the Council Oak Chapter for submitting the KSDAR's first Celebration Grant for America 250! Four other chapters are working on grants for 2023 submission. This Chair encourages all chapters to apply for the Celebration Grants. Eight chapters shared Patriot Spotlights on social media, presented monthly Patriot minutes at meetings, in chapter newsletters, and on cards. Three chapters are currently working on and planning specific meeting activities and service projects to promote America 250! The Dodge City Chapter is collaborating with other genealogical and heritage organizations to increase the impact of their America 250! efforts. Several Kansas daughters provided testimony, written and in person, to the Kansas State Legislature supporting the State of Kansas forming an America 250! Commission. #### **American Heritage**

This was an exciting year for the American Heritage Committee in Kansas. Talented Daughter's from all over the state made 12 guilts to commemorate the 200th anniversary of the Santa Fe Trail. These guilts were displayed at the Santa Fe Trail Center during the summer of 2022. Chapters awarded Quilts of Valor and Christmas stockings were made for the Project Patriot program. Many Kansas daughter's crocheted poppies for the Mary Hill Museum in Washington State. Lap quilts, mug rugs, and fidget quilts were made for various VA and hospice care facilities. Historical costumes were popular with members wearing Civil War, Dolley Madison and Suffragette dresses. There were eight entries in the American Heritage contest in 2022: two Kansas Daughter's placed 2nd in the categories of vocal music and crafts and another placed 3rd in knitting. A winning entry was submitted to the America 250 quilt block contest by the Olathe Chapter. The three national winners in Kansas for 2023 are Leslie Stair, 1st place in Literature/Drama, Julie Crawford, 3rd place in Music/Instrumental and Addison Hinterweger, 1st place in Photography/B/W Enhanced. There were 58 programs with 596 participants shining the light on the American Heritage Committee.

#### **American History**

**Katana Ewbank** 

This Chair is thrilled to report that American History is shining among our 62 Kansas chapters and their communities. Chapters were treated with 186 history programs at chapter meetings in 2022, ranging from field trips and living history events to an overview of the Nicodemus Buffalo Soldiers and Women in WWII from the Curator of the Fort Riley Museum. Kansas Daughters further shared 86 history programs with their communities. When it comes to recognizing Women in American History, 29 chapters conducted 54 programs on outstanding women in American History, and nine strong Kansas women were added to the national database for their contribution to the progress of our nation. 244 public, private, and homeschooled students participated in the American History Essay Contest for students in grades 5-8. Additionally, 46 high school students participated in the Patriots of the American Revolution Essay Contest. Several chapters have started building relationships with local schools, laying a foundation for future contest entries. These chapters provided excellent examples of their commitment to promoting American History. We can rejoice that our DAR Ties of Service and Friendship have helped us to share the sparkle of American History with the state of Kansas.

# American Indians Janis Miller

This State Chair is moved by Kansas chapters' service to the original inhabitants of this land. Fifty-one chapters shared 312 American Indian minutes during their meetings, with Shawnee Mission, Three Trails West and Topeka presenting 12 each. Six chapters secured proclamations for American Indians Heritage month. Fifteen chapters provided financial support, school supplies and gift cards to: American Indian Scholarship Funds \$618, Friends of American Indians \$580, Bacone College \$236.30, Chemawa College \$420, and Haskell Indian Nations University \$5,120, South Dakota Indian School, and Indians in Alaska. Daughters also supported a Choctaw lady, three Haskell students injured in a car accident and five Haskell students over holiday. Fourteen chapters hosted American Indian-themed programs, including American Indian tribal life, utilization of nature, boarding schools, U.S. Native Indian officers, and education about Kaw Indian Chief Lucy's life and partnering with Buffalo C.A.R. Kansas. Daughters toured historical museums, the Shawnee Indian Mission State Historical Site and Wyandot National Burying Ground. One daughter participated in a Medicine Wheel ride. The Polly Ogden Chapter installed and dedicated a historical marker honoring indigenous farming along Wildcat Creek where early indigenous people lived in approximately 1000-1500 A.D. The project was coordinated with the chapter's 110th anniversary.

# Americanism Glennice Musselwhite

Kansas Daughters 'sparkled' by organizing a variety of Americanism events. Chapters assisted with naturalization ceremony receptions and distributed gift bags to new citizens. Council Oak and Sagamore Chapters helped individuals with citizenship applications and questions. Shawnee Mission Chapter snapped photos of new U.S. citizens with the presiding judge. Olathe Chapter quizzed a candidate and made him a congratulatory video. Nathan Edson Chapter continues to support Wreaths Across America and introduced the Red Hat Brigade to help with this project. Captain Jesse Leavenworth Chapter shared the DAR spirit by presenting Challenge Coins to enlisted high school seniors, Newton Chapter remembered the homeless during winter by hanging socks, gloves and hats on fences, Arthur Barrett Chapter briefed teachers on in-service day about DAR resources available and William

Wilson Chapter held a Citizenship Workshop for students and parents. Many chapters gave programs promoting Americanism, donated Quilts of Valor, volunteered at election polls, donated blood, and led Scout troops and 4-H clubs. An outstanding accomplishment by Sagamore Chapter was the Medal of Honor award for a most deserving recipient, Gary Swanson. One of his lifetime achievements includes oral histories of WWII veterans for the Library of Congress Veteran's History Project.

#### Chapter Development & Revitalization Melissa Stuchlik

Chapter Development Revitalization Commission Chair has been working with the Kansas Torch Team helping find chapters that might need some help or assistance in their chapters. The CDRC Chair is assisting chapters that want to hold a workshop for possible applications. The first workshop resulted in five applications completed at the event and another five waiting for final documents. This would have been overwhelming for the chapter registrar who attended and was able to work alongside a very experienced genie. Working with the chapters and their district directors has kept the chair busy and getting to know a lot of wonderful DAR sisters. Regents have contacted her for help in different areas and have been directed to where they need to go or have been helped to find their answer. Looking forward to another successful year for our Kansas chapters.

#### Children of the American Revolution Amanda Tindell

Daughters really sparkled this year supporting the Children of the American Revolution. Twelve chapters support a local C.A.R. Society. Ten supported chapters financially by giving \$845 to C.A.R., \$990 was given to the state society and \$210 to the National Society. Eighteen chapters visited the committee page on the NSDAR website. Eight chapters had a program presented by C.A.R. members with 24 members in attendance. Six chapters participated in the 2022 C.A.R. Day of Service or plan to participate in 2023. Chapter members from 16 chapters attended other C.A.R. events, meetings, or activities with 43 attending and 10 more receiving information about activities. Eleven chapters included an article promoting C.A.R. members in chapter newsletters. Three C.A.R. members participated in DAR contests. Fifty-five C.A.R. membership brochures were provided to new/prospective members. Three hundred and one members have family eligible for and/or are members of C.A.R. Seven members have dual members with

one member joining this year. C.A.R. and D.A.R worked together laying wreaths, commemorating events, putting out flags, welcoming honor flights, and participating in parades.

#### **Commemorative Events**

Over 500 Kansas daughters participated in 4th of July parades or celebrations. Twenty-six Kansas chapters are Commemorative Partners with the United States of America Vietnam War Commemoration, and 20 programs were given. Vietnam Veteran pins and certificates were awarded, as well as several Quilts of Valor. Kansas chapters continued their partnership with the five Vietnam Veterans of America chapters in Kansas and will be presenting them with Honorary Partner flags and certificates in 2023. Many chapters celebrated milestone anniversaries, with the Topeka Chapter celebrating their 125th anniversary. Nine Kansas chapters celebrated the 150th Anniversary of Yellowstone National Park. The 250th Anniversary of the Boston Tea Party was recognized with events by five Kansas chapters, and four chapters held celebrations for the 50th Anniversary of the NASA Space Shuttle Program. Chapters held programs to celebrate the 100th Anniversary of the President signing the American Indian Citizenship Act (1925), the 125th Anniversary of the 1923 DAR Hospital Corps formed with Dr. Anita Newcomb McGee as Chair, and the 125th Anniversary of the Spanish-American War and the 200th Anniversary of Lafayette Farewell Tour. Seven Kansas chapters submitted additional materials to this state committee chair

## **Community Classroom**

Community Classroom Committee chapters participated in 2022 working in pre-K to 12th grade in Kansas Schools. One hundred and five members volunteered in local classrooms. Children impacted numbered 5,446 children impacted along with twenty-nine chapters or individual members provided financial support to a classroom or school function. Various activities in Kansas Community Classrooms were reported including delivering goodies and Sonic drinks during National Teacher Appreciation Week, sharing DAR lesson plans with teachers, and instructing teachers on how to access them. Two chapters submitted lesson plans to NVC Educational Resources. One hundred sixty-six lesson plans were submitted directly to local school districts. Other activities included a Flag Day coloring contest, flags were distributed to students, and Quilts of Valor were given to veterans during the school's

Veteran's Day Event. Accomplishments involved providing teacher kits, and monthly project ideas for schools. One chapter created displays during historical events at school, purchased and donated books, Constitution, pamphlets, and patriotic materials. Kansas Daughters played a part in Read Across America/Dr. Seuss Birthday, Colonial tea/Colonial Trunk, donating braille flags for the Kansas School of the Blind, gift cards given to teachers, Native American Hands-on Trunk including food, legends, and artifacts, and underprivileged students were tutored. Daughters of the American Revolution SPARK the Love of Learning!

#### **Community Service Awards**

This chair is pleased to report that seven Kansas chapters presented eight Community Service Awards in 2022 with the Shawnee Mission Chapter presenting two awards in 2022. Volunteer service included work on community foundations, the Salvation Army, Kiwanis, church, helping to solve crimes and find missing persons, school boards, city commissions, healthcare board, gifting Teddy Bears to children in the ER, adoption counselor at a local cat shelter, working with Quilts of Valor, Girl Scouts volunteering their time to renovate and refresh a space used to help human trafficking victims, and Park Foundation board volunteer. This chair has provided certificates to the seven chapters that participated in the Community Service Awards Committee by honoring outstanding volunteers in their communities.

#### Conservation

Kansas daughters know how important natural resources are, and they worked together to continue the vision of a healthy environment. As Preservers of the Planet, 32 chapters across the state completed 221 conservation projects and 73 percent of chapters reported Conservation Minutes at their meetings and in newsletters. Fifty-five Arbor Day activities took place, and 171 beautiful pollinator gardens were maintained by 38 chapters. Daughters traveled to three DAR Forests outside of Kansas. Seventy-four individuals took part in community clean-up projects. Never Forget Gardens were maintained by Courtney-Spalding and Shawnee Mission Chapters. Topeka Chapter continued their Washburn Campus Tree Project with their 55th tree planting; Recycling continued to be a favorite activity for 65 percent of chapters. Daughters participated in a variety of conservation activities including cleaning headstones, mowing, and weeding cemeteries and churchyards, providing food and water perimeters for wildlife,

participation in the Great Backyard Bird Count, Sunshine Gardens were planted, Leave No Trace lessons were taught to youth, No Straw September was observed, backyards were certified as Sustainable Wildlife Habitats, monarch butterflies were raised, and Earth Day events took place. Kansas daughters continued to show love for our planet and practice good stewardship in 2022.

#### **Constitution Week**

Constitution Week had good support from our 62 Chapters. Thirty-five chapters participated in Bells Across America, Proclamations were obtained by 32 chapters, and 47 chapters either recited the Preamble or had a preamble minute at meetings. All documents were done twice and certified before they were uploaded to the GRS. Congratulations to: Margaret Bates, Prairie Rose Chapter; Shirley Anderson, Topeka Chapter; Heather Belusky, Three Trails West Chapter; Retha Blecha, Desire Tobey Sears Chapter; Sherry Bowlin, John & Hattie Possum Chapter; Barbara Crain, Sagamore Chapter; Kristine Dickson, Mary Wade Strother Chapter; Charlotte Haris, Shawnee Mission Chapter; Vera Hebrank, Polly Ogdon Chapter; Barbara McIntosh, Cofachique Chapter; Kimberly Patrick, Olathe Chapter; Patricia Spencer, Shawnee Mission Chapter, and Vicki Timmons, Mary Draper Chapter for their outstanding efforts. # DAR Leadership Training Committee Leadership Course

#### **DAR Project Patriot**

Kansas Daughters Sparkled during 2022 by supporting Active-Duty military members with great enthusiasm. Forty-six of 62 chapters (74.2 percent) participated in Project Patriot Projects at some level. Kansas Daughters excelled at tailoring their own projects to serve the needs of their communities. Examples include serving snacks to a local guard unit monthly, baking cookies for university ROTC students during finals week, and presenting DAR Challenge Coins to graduating high school seniors who had committed to joining the military. Chapters created over 100 baby blankets which were shipped to Landstuhl Medical Center, as well as providing over 200 Christmas stockings for soldiers at Fort Riley. Thirty-five care packages were shipped to women and 50 to men with the combined value of all packages being \$6,817.25. A total of \$455 was donated directly to DAR approved centers. Chapters contributed \$2,258 to state projects and an additional \$7,091 donated to chapter projects. A whopping 3,917 coupons plus an additional 13 pounds of coupons were processed and shipped to military installations. Active-duty personnel received 5,158 greeting cards with 16 chapters meeting the Operation Cards to the Military Challenge. Kansas Daughters are encouraged to continue their sparkling service to Project Patriot.

# **DAR Scholarship**

Dodge City, Olathe, Prairie Flint Hills, Sagamore, and Three Trails West attended scholarship nights or directly contacted their local high schools. Three Kansas chapters listed scholarship information in their newsletters or gave packets to members with graduating seniors: Four Winds, Prairie Rose, and Sagamore. Four scholarships were awarded. They were the Judd Smith Brooks of \$1000 to Carter Blome, sponsored by Four Winds, KSDAR Scholarship of \$1500 to Adela Lipari, sponsored by Olathe. Esther Lowrey Chapter awarded two scholarships. Ava O'Brien received the Elizabeth M Hill Kessler Scholarship of \$930 and the Gladys E Routh Scholarship of \$1055 went to Tessa Jim. Thank you, committee members Carol Holcomb and Renee Gruen.

DAR School Sue Cornelsen

It is a privilege to serve the Kline Administration and the Kansas Daughters as the Chair for DAR Schools. Our Schools are the jewels of DAR, and our chapters support our schools in many ways. Our Daughters recorded 27 school pins purchased and nearly \$1000 donated! One hundred forty-two of us viewed the DAR School videos on the website and 18 chapters talked about our schools at either their meetings or in their newsletters. Our Kansas chapters were creative in their donations to our five schools: A weigh-in by the Courtney-Spalding Chapter earned \$135 to the schools. Amazon Smile and Box Tops for Education were also used for donations. We donated Christmas Cards, packets of seeds and quilting supplies to Hindman, Christmas gifts and funding for Christmas gifts to Crossnore, and the Mary Draper Chapter donated 772 pairs of socks. Many of our Kansas Daughters purchased School merchandise at our 2022 Continental Congress where each school had a booth to raise funds. This chairperson was privileged to attend the 98th Dedication Day at Kate Duncan Smith School in Alabama. What a wonderful celebration of achievements that was! #### **DAR Service for Veterans**

Ninety percent of all chapters submitted a report for activities in their chapters. Seventy percent of state chapters participated in Wreaths Across America and these generous members donated 2,919 wreaths. As you can see, the support is strong for this important program. KSDAR had a record 22 chapters who participated in Honor Flights, including those who welcomed home the veterans in person. Increasing participation across the state in Honor Flights is one of this chair's priorities during her tenure. Although in-person volunteer opportunities have been limited at VA facilities, members have found ways to volunteer in other ways. Members held ceremonies to present Quilts of Valor to over 20 veterans, held "baby showers" for female service members. Several chapters donated stamps for the Stamps for the Wounded. Several chapter members knitted hats and scarves and made tie blankets to donate to VA facilities. Youth volunteered over 500 hours

while adults volunteered 570 hours. Members traveled almost 16,000 miles in support of veterans. Monetary donations were \$14,000 and non-cash donation (clothing, food, gifts, games, etc.) were over \$25,000. Madam Regent, this chair is honored to serve as chair of DAR Service to Veterans.

#### The Flag of the United States of America Katherine Hays

Kansas Daughters were active in 2022 honoring the Flag of the United States of America. Chapters coordinated activities with the American Legion, VFW, SAR, and civic groups. They celebrated the flag by participating in Honor Flights and Wreaths Across America. Patriotic displays were seen throughout communities including parades, 4th of July activities, and a 9/11 Commemorative Ceremony. Flags have been posted in parks, on veterans' graves, in retirement communities, city bridges, courthouses, and libraries. Numerous flag distributions were reported for students from Pre-K through 12, including Good Citizen award recipients. Kansas Daughters have participated in the Flag raising ceremonies at Constitution Hall in Washington DC. Outstanding activities include The KSDAR "Tale of Two Flags" presentation for Kansas and Pennsylvania Daughters and the installation of a bronze braille Flag at Deanna Rose Children's Farmstead. Other projects included: Four Winds Chapter distributing flag literature to 10 elementary schools; SAR Compatriots training Tomahawk members for the honor guard to welcome home Honor Flight veterans; Desire Tobey Sears decorating a patriotic Christmas Tree in the courthouse and presenting a 5th grade Flag Etiquette program; Arthur Barrett Chapter donating funds to replace flags on the City Bridge. Kansas Daughters continues to sparkle in their support of the Flag of the United States of America.

Several chapters did projects on the local level for example, indexing cemeteries, indexing the 1950 Census, scanning Bible pages, and indexing books for local libraries. This state chair has already gotten two finished volumes for the 2023 year. The goal of this state chair is to encourage chapters to turn their local projects in to the GRC and make them available to all DAR members for use in their DAR applications. This State Chair's goal is to continue to support The Stars and Stripes Administration by improving this year's total for 2023.

#### **Historic Preservation**

Thirty-four of the 59 DAR Kansas chapters sparkled in Historic Preservation in 2022. Seventy-one Historic Preservation programs were provided to DAR members and the public, with Three Trails West providing a record 15. Twenty-seven chapters were involved in historic preservation projects. Seven chapters gave historic preservation awards to DAR members and to the community. Members of Abilene, Courtney-Spauling, Dodge City, Isabella Weldin, and Little Arkansas Chapters participated in cleaning gravesite headstones in Kansas, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, and Oklahoma. Three chapters received grants and three dedications were held. Randolph Loving member Janice Buselt worked with federal and local officials to correct a dishonorable discharge classification for her great-grandfather so he could receive a military marker. Polly Ogden Chapter was the state's only entry in the NSDAR Historic Preservation Project Contest and is working on a project to establish a historical marker in an area where early indigenous people lived in 1000-1500 A.D. Sagamore Chapter member Barbara Crain manages 13,000 memorials for findagrave.com. Shawnee Mission Chapter member Carla Sutton researched and coordinated placement of a monument honoring 400 African Americans buried without headstones in a Missouri cemetery. The project will be displayed on a kiosk at the Kansas City International Airport.

# Insignia Colleen Anderson

This chairman is proud to share information about the NSDAR beautiful insignia. At the last state conference, a pin exchange and information time was granted by the State Regent. Beloved pins were offered for eligible members to acquire at a conference meeting. A fee was charged to attend along with pin purchases, but drawings were held for gift cards to the Insignia Store. Information on placement and qualification for pins was available at the state conference. The unsold pins were returned to the donors. The qualifications and placement information were again available at the Kansas Fall event in a display of Insignia Pins. This chairman was available to answer questions at the display. Two chapters asked this chairman to present a power point presentation about DAR Insignia, pins, and ribbons. Travel of 258 miles to reach these chapters was required. Members are interested in DAR Insignia and want to be correct about wearing them. Nine chapters reported entries in the contests; Abilene, Cofachique, Dodge City, Esther Lowrey, Flores del Sol, Four Winds, General Edward Hand, Marais des Cygnes, and Polly Ogden. So much changed with the CMR for 2022. Levels became ribbons. With points awarded as follows; Blue Ribbon is six hundred plus, Red Ribbon is four hundred and fifty plus, and White is three hundred plus. More points were needed at each level however, there were more opportunities to earn points. These changes brought some confusion for regents, but they successfully navigated the report. Minimal help was requested by regents! Due to the many changes, this chair had a display at the September meeting to highlight these changes. To assist regents, the display from the September meeting was sent to them via email, along with information to find the planning guide and fact sheet. Subsequent emails were sent offering tips and help. Forty-three chapters attained Blue Ribbon Status, eight earned a Red Ribbon, four earned a

White Ribbon and seven chapters did not receive a rating. With summer approaching, I would encourage regents to use the 2022 planning guide when planning their new year. Plan your meetings and activities around this guide to maximize points for 2023.

Membership Laura Kaiser

Kansas chapters sparkled in 2022 with 192 new members by application! The percentage of membership increase ranged from 14 percent to 22 percent. Chapters utilized creative ways to increase membership and engage and retain new members. To increase membership and retention, this Chair posted the NSDAR Membership Monday posts weekly on the KSDAR Facebook page, provided training at the KSDAR District Trainings, was a member of the KSDAR Torch Talk Team, and initiated some "sparkling" ideas. Sparkling pins were given to qualifying training/event attendees and the "You Are a Sparkler" program for the chapters was started. New this administration is the position of Membership Vice Chair who oversees the Kansas Prospective Member Database (PMD). Two hundred forty-five inquiries were forwarded to the Kansas PMD in 2022, an increase over the previous year. These inquiries resulted in 120 new members, nearly a 50 percent success rate. The PMD Chair encouraged chapters to keep their PMD current to maintain accurate reporting. Your State Membership Committee has developed and initiated a very successful, personalized program for chapters to participate in dedicated Zoom calls to review and update their PMD. It is an honor to serve during the Legacy of Liberty Administration and help chapters ignite the spark of membership.

National Defense Dixie Drake

2022 has been a great year for the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution. They again outdid themselves in National Defense activities. The National Defender was used by 50 chapters for their three-minute report. "Steinway Victory Verticals" was a favorite article of the publication. KSDAR chapters had some riveting programs that included talks on the Scotch-Irish soldiers in the Battle of Cowpens and Nazi Stumbling Stones. Forty-one chapters devoted at least three minutes to a National Defense Report at every regular meeting. Medals were awarded throughout the state: 19 National Defense, five gold ROTC, 26 JROTC, and one DAR Distinguished Citizen Medal. The John & Hattie Possum Chapter awarded 10 DAR Youth Citizenship

Medals. A donation of \$490 was donated directly to ROTC and other cadet award programs. Challenge Coins were presented to graduating seniors joining the military. Arthur Barrett Chapter awarded a Distinguished Citizen Medal to a chapter member who's also a veteran nurse. Mission Hills Chapter had a member complete her New Horizons Course, and for her project, collected the names of veterans in her church. Chapters provided meals to veterans and participated in Wreaths Across America. Another momentous year of National Defense in the books!

#### **Patriot Records Project**

The Patriot Records Project has only been around for eight years. Its purpose is to make finding and identifying Revolutionary War Patriots easier. Volunteers index the names of men and women who fought or helped during the War for Independence. Any DAR member can volunteer for this committee by writing to patriotrecords@nsdar.org. There is also a Patriot Records Project Pin which one becomes eligible for after indexing 10,000 surnames. Twenty-three Kansas Daughters, in 2022, indexed a total of 155,728 names. This was accomplished by members from 16 chapters. Four of our Daughters indexed over 10,000 names: Retha Blecha of the Desire Tobey Sears Chapter, Charlene Yuenger of the Olathe Chapter, Barbara Crain of the Sagamore Chapter, and Viola Patterson of the Where the Trail Divides Chapter. Two of our Daughters were over 9,000 names, and this chairman is sure that they will reach that 10,000 goal very soon. This chairman participated in the Committee Fair at the 2022 State September meeting to encourage our Daughters to get to know what this committee does and how to get involved. Over the coming year, this chair plans to have several articles in the Cyber Sunflower to increase participation.

Kansas chapters were extremely active in utilizing media to promote events, recruit new members, and perform public relations within the state. Kansas has a total of 3,049 members, and even the smallest most rural chapters had success with print media. Thirty-four Kansas chapters reported that they used Public Relations and Media during 2022. Additionally, 35 chapters have a newsletter, 35 chapters communicate with members with social media and/or a private website, 36 chapters received print coverage, 13 chapters received broadcast coverage (60 percent increase from 2021), and 34 chapters initiated publicity for a commemorative or community event. Kansas chapters received exciting coverage and publicity on the following events and activities: installing new historical markers in Abilene, reminders to wear RED on Friday to support our military, Mission Monday at The Barn in Burrton, KS, flag retirement ceremonies, and Shawnee Mission Chapter helped to plan and brought several groups together to design and install a Never Forget Garden. This chair will provide certificates to six Kansas chapters for outstanding media and newsletters: Abilene, Desire Tobey Sears, Mary Alice Foley, Newton, Prairie Flint Hills, and Shawnee Mission. These chapters provided excellent examples of their work publicizing the DAR and its many projects.

#### **Service to America**

This chair is excited and pleased to report that Kansas Daughters excelled in Service to America logging a total of 132,871 hours of service in 2022, surpassing the state goal of 91,650 hours for the year. Sixty-one percent, or 38 chapters, met and exceeded their chapter's goal. Fifty chapters submitted Service to America reports and 36 chapters have committee chairs. Of these chapters 27 planned Service to America Projects, 17 chapters cleaned headstones or completed

restoration projects at area cemeteries and 45 chapters participated in DAR Annual Day of Service on or around October 11th. This chair highlighted three chapters and their members at the District Level. This Chair is also honored to provide 38 certificates to chapters exceeding their service hour goals. Whether hosting a Women Veteran's Brunch, hosting classes to raise supplies for Topeka Rescue Mission, purchasing a braille Pledge of Allegiance plaque, sending cards to active service members and veterans, or visiting shut-ins, or any of the many unique and caring ways that chapters and members volunteer, Kansas Daughters show that there is no service too great or too small –that all have value. Well done Kansas Daughters!

## **Specialty Research**

KSDAR Specialty Research committee is a brand-new national committee formed by the Wright Administration to recognize the significant, but less frequently recognized, contributions of men and women who reflect the remarkable diversity of our country. The objective of this committee is to assist members and the public to understand the contributions of under-represented patriots. Research, support, and education will focus on African American, French, French Canadians, Jewish, Native American, and Spanish patriots utilizing advanced application research with the goal to expand awareness and membership. Support materials, webinars and training are being developed for general use, but there are experts available in each of the categories to help now.

## **Volunteer Genealogists**

## **Bunnie Bowen**

Forty-four Kansas chapters have at least one NSDAR trained Volunteer Genealogist, for a total of 123 ladies who are helping their own and other chapters gain new members and complete supplemental applications. Thirty-three members took one or more paid Genealogy Education Program 1-4 classes, 86 GEP classes in total. Two new paid classes were released at the conclusion of Continental Congress in June 2021, and 12 members completed the eAPPs guide, and seven completed the Mid-Level Review class. In its third year, an additional 13 chapter registrars completed the free registrars' course, this course is encouraged for all chapter registrars. Four chapters requested assistance from the America 250! MTF. Nine chapters presented genealogy workshops, attended by 112 people. Seven members accepted formal assignments to chapters other than their own. Certificates for

"Outstanding Achievement" were awarded to nine chapters and 17 members for 2022. The Kansas Outstanding Volunteer Genealogist Award for 2022 will be announced at the April 2023 State Conference. From Good Land in the west to Overland Park in the east, and everywhere in between, Kansas Daughters are to be commended for volunteering their time, knowledge and resources to increase NSDAR membership.

## Volunteer Information Specialists Mary Ayers/Jillian Pence

Kansas chapters continued to embrace technology to engage members and prospective members in person and remotely. Many different applications were leveraged to conduct hybrid meetings for out-of-town members and others unable to attend in person. Additionally, new websites and social media accounts were developed to encourage member and community engagement. Many chapters have begun to disseminate newsletters and other announcements electronically. Several have reported that they leverage a Google Drive, accessible by all members, to share and retain photos, newsletters, meeting agendas and minutes, yearbooks, and other documents.

Women's Issues Delores Clarke

Five chapters had entries for the Women's Issues Essay contest. All five essays were in the "Family Issues" category. The winner for the state was Jennifer Hess, Newton, "Leaf Your Troubles to the Lord." One hundred ninety-six Women's Issues minutes were read at chapter meetings. Twenty-one chapters provided additional information on their projects and activities. One chapter submitted something for special recognition. This Chair is looking forward to this year and many more activities and projects. This Chair is proud of every woman who helps make up the Kansas Society of DAR and proudly promotes Women's Issues. It has been a pleasure getting to know so many more of you this past year.

## **Audit Committee Report**

The members of the Audit Committee have examined the records of the State Treasurer of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution, namely account registers for checking, savings and investment accounts, bank statements, and supporting documentation. We find the records to be in good order and their contents to appear reasonable. We have also reviewed the financial statements for Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution, which summarize the records referred to above, for the year ended Dec. 31, 2022. These statements appear to fairly represent the financial position and the revenue and expenses for the organization.

Bylaws Janelle DeFrees

From December 2022 to January 2023, the KSDAR bylaws committee met three times via Zoom to coordinate preparation of the proposed bylaw/standing rules amendments for the 2023 KSDAR Spring Conference. Of the 18 proposed amendments, most pertain to updating the duties of the officers, refining the parameters and timeline for nominations of state officers during an election year, renaming the September meeting in order to create flexibility, creating qualifications for serving on the state nominating committee as well as serving as an officer at the district level, clarifying duties of the bylaws committee in regard to maintaining the KSDAR bylaws and officially establishing an Investment Committee. Of the 15 proposed amendments to the standing rules; four pertained to scholarships, one updated the list of KSDAR chapters, one proposed an increase in the Web hosting chapter contribution, one proposed an increase in workshop allowance, and one proposed an increase in allotment to the State Regent for Kansas Pages at Continental Congress. Special appreciation is extended to these bylaw committee members: Carol Crane, Eleanor Zuvanich, Stacy Cope, Donita Dupslaff, and advisor, State Parliamentarian Mary Frisch.

Credentials Barb Knopke

Credentials forms were received from 51 chapters for the 2023 KSDAR State Conference held in Wichita. Of the 225 possible delegates per chapter membership size, the conference had 161 delegates entitled to vote. Twenty-six alternates, 53 non-voting members and 10 guests for a total of 250 registered with the Credentials table. Credentials welcomed

five special guests: Cindy Bell, Nevada State Regent; Beatrice Carolyn Nutt, Massachusetts State Regent; Marcia Shavlik, Nebraska State Regent; Peggy Thomas Whitcomb, National Chair, DAR Project Patriot Committee; and Sarah Brooks, National Chair, Junior Membership. As per the KSDAR Bylaws, the voting delegates and alternates for any special meeting that may be called prior to the following State Conference. Therefore, this chair submitted a report of the Credentials Forms received as of Feb. 29, 2023, to serve as a record of the voting delegates and alternates should a special meeting be called. Many thanks to the members of this committee: State Treasurer, Tena Brucken and State Registrar, Linda Jensen, as their knowledge was greatly appreciated. ## **Kansas DAR Library**

The Kansas Daughters engaged in activities supporting the NSDAR Library, KSDAR library integrated within the special collection in the genealogical research pavilion at the Wichita Advanced Learning Library, county, local, school, and classroom libraries. The NSDAR library received 20 books from Kansas; eight were from the Newton Chapter and seven were from the Shawnee Mission Chapter. Three books were given to the WALL. The Friends of the Library received \$1,420 in donations from six chapters; Shawnee Mission with a \$550 for a Life Membership and Topeka Chapter gave \$470. Donations for Friends of Seimes totaled \$803 with Shawnee Mission giving \$750. Other financial gifts were given were by the Courtney-Spalding Chapter to the Russell Library's Book Bike Program. Memorial gifts were given by the General Edward Hand Chapter to their local library. John Athey Chapter also donated to their local library. Over 800 books were donated to local libraries, eighty books were given to chapter libraries, and over 500 books were given to classroom libraries. Two Kansas daughters found new homes for 1,100 books. Nine chapters reported Book Club activity. Several chapters honored librarians on "Thank a Librarian Day." Seventeen individuals and 24 chapters were awarded certificates for various outstanding library activities.

# KANSAS SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION SOUTHWEST DISTRICT GUIDELINES

#### NAME

The name is the Southwest District of the Kansas Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

#### OBJECT

The object of this District is to expand the programs of the State and National Societies; to promote fellowship among members; to provide instruction and inspiration to members; to acquaint members with the State Officers and State Committee Chairs.

#### **MEMBERS**

The members of the Southwest District are members in good standing of the chapters of this district.

#### **MEETINGS**

The annual Meeting of the southwest District shall be held in the fall and shall be in accordance with the Bylaws of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution.

#### FINANCES

#### Section 1: Dues

Annual dues of \$5.00 shall be paid by each chapter in the district to the KSDAR State Treasurer as part of their chapter's remittance due December 1st of each year, using the KSDAR Remittance Form. These funds shall constitute the operating budget and shall be used for postage, copying, printing and other district expenses.

#### Section 2: Southwest District Account

All money from district, fundraising, donations, dues or other sources shall be held by the KSDAR State Treasurer in the Southwest District Account to be used for district expenses or special projects.

#### Section 3: Contributions

Contributions made by the district shall be for DAR projects and must be approved at the Annual District Meeting.

#### **OFFICERS**

#### Section 1: Officers

The officers of the District are a Director, an Assistant Director and a Secretary-Treasurer.

#### Section 2: Term

The officers shall be elected for a term of three years as stated in the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution bylaws. An officer who has served more than one-half term in a District office shall be deemed to have served a term.

#### **EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE**

## Section 1: Members

The Executive Committee shall include the officers of the District; the State Regent may be an ex-officio member.

#### Section 2: Duties

The Executive Committee shall direct the business of the District between Annual Meetings.

#### Section 3: Vacancies

The Executive Committee shall fill all vacancies except that of Director which is filled by the Assistant Director, until the next Annual Meeting when the vacancy for the unexpired term will be filled by the District members.

#### NOMINATIONS AND ELECTION

## Section 1: State Nominating Committee Representative

In the third year of an administration, a member and an alternate to represent the District on the State Nominating Committee shall be elected from the floor.

## Section 2: District Nominating Committee

a. A nominating committee of three members and an alternate; representing different chapters, shall be elected from the floor

during the second year of the administration. The chair shall be chosen by the committee.

- b. No member shall serve on two consecutive nominating committees.
- c. The nominating committee shall make its report to the District Director by August 1 of the election year.
- d. Nominations may be made from the floor if the consent of the nominee has previously been obtained.
- e. Election shall be by ballot, except where there is only one nominee for office, in which case the elections shall be by voice vote.
- f. A majority vote of those present shall constitute an election.

#### **DUTIES OF OFFICERS**

#### Section 1: The Director shall

- a. Preside at the annual District Meeting.
- b. Assist the State Vice Regent and applicable State Officers and Chairs, with the approval of the State Regent, in planning the September Meeting and the State Conference when the District is host.
- c. Send required notices of any pending business to the chapters of the District.
- d. Present the Chapter Regents of the District at the Chapter Regents' Function during State Conference.
- e. Oversee all other District functions as needed.

#### Section 2: The Assistant Director shall:

- a. Serve in the Director's absence or inability to fulfill her duties.
- b. Become Director if the office of District Director becomes vacant
- c. Assist in any capacity requested.

## Section 3: The Secretary-Treasurer shall

- a. Record the minutes of the meeting and send a copy to the District Director for approval.
- b. Send an annual District Report, including all election results by October 1st, to the State Regent and State Recording Secretary to be included in the Annual Report and Proceedings.
- c. Oversee all District financial matters.
- d. Assist in any capacity requested.

#### **AMENDMENTS**

The Southwest District Guidelines may be amended by majority vote of those present at the Annual Meeting. Provided that they do not conflict with the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution Bylaws or Standing Rules or the bylaws of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution and provided that any such amendment has been submitted to the Southwest District Chapters, District Officers and State Regent, thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting.

Annual dues of \$6.00 shall be paid by each chapter in the district to the KSDAR State Treasurer as part of their chapter's remittance due December 1st of each year, using the KSDAR State Remittance Form. These funds shall constitute the operating budget and shall be used for postage, copying, printing and other district expenses.

#### Section 2: Northwest District Account:

All money from district fundraising, donations, dues or other sources shall be held by the KSDAR State Treasurer in the Northwest District Account to be used for district expenses or special projects.

- b. Assist the State Vice Regent with the approval of the State Regent in planning the September Meeting when the District is host.
- c. Send required notices of any pending business to the chapters of the District.
- d. Present the Chapter Regents of the District at the Chapter Regents Function during State Conferences.
- e. Oversee all other District functions as needed.

#### Section 2: The Assistant Director:

- a. Serve in the Director's absence or inability to fulfill her duties.
- b. Become Director if the office of District Director becomes vacant.
- c. Assist in any capacity requested.

Section 3: The Secretary-Treasurer shall:

- a. Record the minutes of the meeting and send a copy to the District Director for approval.
- b. Send an annual District Report, including all election results, to the State Regent and State Recording Secretary to be included in the Annual Report and Proceedings.
- c. Oversee all District financial matters.
- d. Assist in any capacity requested.

#### **AMENDMENTS**

The Southeast District Guidelines may be amended by majority vote of those present at the Annual Meeting, provided that they do not conflict with the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution Bylaws or Standing Rules or the Bylaws of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution and provided that any such amendment has been submitted to the Southeast District Chapters, District Officers and State Regent, thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting.

#### KSDAR STATE OFFICERS CLUB GUIDELINES

(Adopted March 2004, (Amended April 23, 2015)

#### ARTICLE I - Name

The name of the club shall be the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, State Officers Club.

## ARTICLE II – Object

The object of this club shall be to foster sociability and friendship among the members and to promote the interests of the National and Kansas Societies of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

#### ARTICLE III – Members

Section 1. Those eligible for membership shall be the current and past state officers of the Kansas Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who are members in good standing.

Section 2. Newly elected officers shall be eligible for membership at the first annual meeting following the installation of the incoming state regent at Continental Congress.

#### ARTICLE IV – Fees and Dues

- Section 1. The initiation fee for new members shall be five dollars (\$5.00).
- Section 2. The annual dues shall be one dollar (\$1.00) per member, payable at or before the annual meeting each year.
- Section 3. Life membership offered for a payment of \$5.00 was closed in 1995, but such memberships in effect will continue to be honored.

# ARTICLE V – Meetings

- Section 1. The Annual Meeting shall be held during the State Conference at a time suitable to the State Regent.
- Section 2. Special meetings of the State Officers Club or the State Officers Club Executive Committee may be called by the president and shall be called upon the written request of five members.
- Section 3. A quorum of the annual meeting shall be the number present.

#### ARTICLE VI – Officers

Section 1. The officers of the club shall be president, two vice presidents, a chaplain, a secretary and treasurer.

Section 2. Election procedures. The election of officers shall be held at the annual meeting. A nominating committee of three members shall report a nominee for each office. Nominations may be made from the floor with the prior consent of the nominee. The election shall be by ballot, unless there is but one nominee for each office, in which case the election may be made by voice. A majority vote of members present shall elect. The second vice president shall be the chair of the nominating committee and shall appoint the two other members of the committee. The term of the office shall be for three years, and no officer may succeed herself.

#### Section 3. Duties of the Officers.

- a. The President shall preside at all meetings and shall appoint all committees except the nominating committee. She shall confer with the State Regent regarding the plans for the annual meeting. She shall approve the disbursement of club funds. She shall send a report of the meeting to the State Recording Secretary for the KSDAR Annual Proceedings.
- b. The First Vice President shall perform the duties of the president in her absence and shall serve as the chair of the bylaws committee. She shall serve as the doorkeeper. She shall be the membership chair and shall notify the newly elected State Society Officers that they are eligible for membership in the club. She shall arrange for the initiation of the new members. The Second Vice President shall be the chair of the nominating committee. She shall appoint two other members to serve on the committee. She shall report items of significant important about the membership.
- c. The Chaplain shall conduct memorial and religious services as the occasion may require. She shall be in charge of the installation of new officers.
- d. The Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of all meetings and shall be the custodian of the club records. She shall send the president a copy of the minutes immediately after the meeting. She shall send a copy of the minutes to the newly elected State Officers Club officers.
- e. The Treasurer shall collect dues and shall keep an itemized account of funds collected. Before the annual meeting, she shall ask the conference treasurer for the balance in the club account and for the names of members who have made reservations for the meal identifying those who have included their annual dues.

She shall deposit all funds with the KSDAR State Treasurer with an itemized account and shall notify the State Treasurer of funds to be dispersed. She shall keep a list of active members, of eligible members, and of life members.

f. Officers may be called upon to report at the annual meeting.

#### ARTICLE VII – Executive Committee

- Section 1. The elected officers shall constitute the Executive Committee.
- Section 2. A quorum of the Executive Committee shall be three members.
- Section 3. If there is a vacancy in the office of president, the first vice president shall succeed to that office. A vacancy in any other office shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

## ARTICLE VIII - Guests

The guests of the KSDAR State Conference who are members of the DAR may be guests at the annual meeting, and the cost involved shall be paid from the conference funds. There shall be no other guests at the annual meeting.

#### ARTICLE IX – Amendments

- Section 1. These bylaws shall become effective upon acceptance by the club.
- Section 2. These bylaws may be amended at the annual meeting by a majority vote of the members present, provided that the amendment has been proposed by the executive committee or by any three members of the club.
- Section 3. The rules contained in *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised* shall govern the club in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with these bylaws or any ruling of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution or of the Kansas Society.

#### STANDING RULES

1. In memory of a deceased member, twenty dollars shall be allowed for a memorial book to be selected by the State Librarian and placed in the KSDAR State Library with a bookplate listing the name of the member and date of KSDAR office/offices held and citing the club as donor.

- 2. In the second year of a KSDAR administration a monetary gift shall be made to a Kansas DAR project.
- 3. Suggested Agenda: Call to Order, opening prayer and memorial tribute when indicated, Introduction of guests, Initiation of new members, when needed, Business Officer report, election, etc., Installation of Officers, Program, Brag Box, Adjournment.

# GUIDELINES – KANSAS CHAPTER REGENTS' CLUB OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

SEPTEMBER 5, 2014

#### ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this club shall be the Kansas Chapter Regents' Club of the Kansas Society.

#### ARTICLE II – OBJECT

The Object of this Regents' Club shall be to further the plans of the National Society and State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution; to maintain harmonious cooperation among the chapters in Kansas; to plan and execute patriotic, historic, and educational work in the state; and to particularly foster closer relationships among the chapters, friendships among the officers, and to encourage the exchange of ideas.

## ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

- Section 1. The membership of the Kansas Chapter Regents' Club shall include past, present and incoming Regents in Kansas.
- Section 2. The annual dues shall be one dollar (\$1.00) per member and are payable at the annual meeting.
- Section 3. Life membership of \$5.00 will entitle the member to purchase the chapter regents' club pin. This does not exempt the payment of annual dues.
- Section 4. The annual dues shall go to supporting the State Regent's Project during the 3rd year.

#### ARTICLE IV – OFFICERS

- Section 1. The officers of the club shall be: President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer. These officers shall constitute an Executive Committee.
- Section 2. Three members of the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum.
- Section 3. Vacancies in office shall be filled by the Executive Committee.
- Section 4. The term of office shall be one year only, and no officer may succeed herself. Election shall be viva voce.

# KANSAS SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

## STATE CHAIRMEN'S CLUB GUIDELINES

REVISED 2015, 2021, 2022

#### ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this club shall be the KSDAR State Chairmen's Club

## ARTICLE II – OBJECT

The object of this club shall be to promote the work of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution and KSDAR National and State committee projects.

#### ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. Any member of KSDAR who is past or present chair of a National or State committee shall be eligible for membership in the State Chairmen's Club.

Section 2. The annual dues shall be one dollar (\$1.00) per member and are payable at the annual meeting.

- a) An application fee of five dollars (\$5.00) will entitle the members to purchase the State Chairmen's Club pin.
- b) The State Regent of KSDAR may be invited to become an honorary member while in office.
- c) Any past chairmen, with the exception of life members, who have not paid dues within a consecutive two-year period, shall be considered inactive and shall be dropped, but may be reinstated by paying dues for the current year.

## ARTICLE IV – MEETINGS

Section 1. The annual meeting of the club shall be held during the KSDAR State September Meeting. If the KSDAR State September Meeting is held virtually, the Club's meeting may be held virtually (as long as it allows for simultaneous aural communication).

Section 2. KSDAR State September meeting guests may be honored guests at the annual meeting with the expense of the meal paid by the club.

Section 3. A quorum shall be the number present.

#### ARTICLE V – OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of this club shall be a president, a vice-president, a recording secretary and a treasurer.

Section 2. The officers make up the executive committee. Three (3) officers constitute a quorum at any executive committee meeting.

Section 3. The duties of the officers are:

- a) The president shall conduct the annual meeting and any executive meetings that are necessary.
- b) The president may appoint any committee that is necessary to promote the object of the club.
- c) She may assign any necessary duty to the vice-president.
- d) The vice-president shall perform the duties of the president in her absence and perform any necessary duty assigned by the president.
- e) In case of the resignation of the president, the vice-president shall be declared president.
- f) The secretary shall record the minutes of all meetings and keep a file of the proceedings. A copy of the minutes of the annual meeting shall be sent to the State Recording Secretary for the Proceedings.
- g) The treasurer shall collect the dues, be responsible for any fund of the club. The treasurer shall ensure all expenses ordered by the president or the club are paid by the KSDAR treasurer in a timely manner.
- h) Before the books are turned over to the successor, the treasurer shall give a list of active members and their addresses to the president and the secretary.

#### ARTICLE VI – ELECTIONS

Section 1. The election of officers shall be held at the annual meeting during the third year of an administration.

Section 2. Nominations may be made from the floor.

Section 3. Election shall be by ballot if more than one name is nominated for any office.

Section 4. In case of one nominee, the election may be by voice.

Section 5. A plurality vote elects.

Section 6. The term of office shall coincide with that of the state Society, and no officer shall succeed herself.

Section 7. Vacancies in any office shall be filled by the executive committee.

#### ARTICLE VII – COMMITTEES

The president shall appoint any committee that is necessary to promote the object of the club. The Club's executive committee may meet electronically as long as all officers can hear each other simultaneously and participate simultaneously.

#### ARTICLE VIII - AMENDMENT

These rules may be amended at any annual meeting by a majority vote.

# GUIDELINES OF CAMEO GENERATIONS, KSDAR REVISED APRIL 25, 2019

## ARTICLE I - NAME

This organization shall be known as Cameo Generations, Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution.

#### ARTICLE II – OBJECTS

The objects of this organization shall be to promote understanding and fellowship between generations; to encourage the passage of

genealogical information, family history and patriotism to subsequent generations; and, to uphold the principles of NSDAR.

## ARTICLE III – ELIGIBILITY

Section 1. Membership in Cameo Generations, KSDAR, shall be open to any KSDAR grandmother, mother, daughter, granddaughter, sister, niece, aunt or cousin, to include any member with a genealogical tie, who can prove simultaneous membership with a living or deceased relative in the NSDAR.

Section 2. Each NSDAR member joining Cameo Generations, KSDAR, during the first year shall be known as a Charter Member.

Section 3. Each NSDAR member who wishes to join Cameo Generations, KSDAR, is required to submit a Cameo Generations Application for Membership to the Cameo Generations' Registrar.

#### ARTICLE IV – DUES

Application fee shall be \$ 1.00. Annual dues shall be \$ 5.00, payable no later than the first day of the month in which state conference is held. If a Charter Member has joined in conjunction with a deceased grandmother, mother, daughter, granddaughter, sister, aunt, niece or cousin, to include any member with a genealogical tie, all application fees must be paid, however, no further dues are expected for the deceased member.

#### ARTICLE V - MEETINGS

Section 1. The annual meeting shall be held in conjunction with the KSDAR State Conference. The details of time, place, and character of said function shall be arranged by the Executive Committee and the membership will be notified via the March issue of the KSDAR News. Section 2. Special meetings of the Board may be called by the President at such time as she may deem best or upon written request of three (3) members of the Board. Special meetings of the organization may be called upon written request of five (5) members.

### ARTICLE VI – OFFICERS

Per amendments passed, officers should be Secretary, Treasurer/Registrar.

#### ARTICLE VII - ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers shall be elected at the annual State Conference and shall serve a term of three (3) years in conjunction with the KSDAR Administration.

Section 2. Officers shall not serve two consecutive terms in the same office.

Section 3. Nominations shall be made by a nominating committee with provision for nominations from the floor. All elections shall be by ballot, except when there is only one candidate for an office when the election may be by acclamation.

#### ARTICLE VIII – DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

PRESIDENT: She shall preside at all meetings of Cameo Generations and the Board, and shall perform all the usual duties of a presiding officer. She will fill vacancies in office, such action subject to confirmation by at least a majority affirmative vote of the Board. The Secretary will send out and receive the vote to be taken by mail within two weeks of the appointment. An officer so named serves until the next Annual Meeting. She shall appoint all committees, subject to the approval of the Board. She shall call a special meeting of the Executive Board upon written request of any three (3) members and of the organization upon written request of any five (5) members thereof.

VICE-PRESIDENT/HISTORIAN: The Vice-President shall, in the absence of the President, preside at all meetings of the organization. The Vice-President shall fill a vacancy in the office of the President until the next Annual Meeting at which time an election shall be held to elect a candidate to fill the remaining portion of the unexpired term. As Historian, she shall be responsible for keeping information of historical importance for the organization.

SECRETARY/REGISTRAR: The Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meetings of the organization and of the Executive Board. Upon completion of the minutes, she shall forward a copy of the minutes to the President. She shall prepare and mail other correspondence as may be required by the President, the organization or the Executive Board. As Registrar, she shall furnish application forms to candidates and shall be responsible for the examination and verification of all applications for membership. Applications shall be signed by the Registrar and President. She shall keep a register of names

and dates of membership of all members. The Registrar shall retain custody of all original application papers.

TREASURER: The Treasurer shall receive the fees and dues for members and all money raised for the belonging to Cameo Generations. She shall keep and account between the organization and the members. When arrears have continued for a period of one year, a delinquent member must be dropped by the Board and the member notified of such action. In conjunction with the Registrar, the Treasurer will maintain an up-to-date membership list. The Treasurer will put the meeting date and dues in the February issue of KSDAR *CyberSunflower*. The Treasurer will deposit the organizations' moneys with the KSDAR State Treasurer with explanations as to what the moneys are from. Expenditures must be authorized by the President and the Treasurer of Cameo Generations.

CHAPLAIN: The Chaplain shall prepare and present a devotional and benediction at each meeting. She shall be responsible for all benevolent correspondence.

#### ARTICLE IX – INSIGNIA

The official insignia of Cameo Generations shall be either the cameo designed by Hamilton Jewelry or a cameo pin of the member's choice.

## ARTICLE X – AMENDMENTS

Proposed amendments to the Bylaws must be submitted in writing to the Executive Board by January 1, prior to the Annual Meeting. These Bylaws may be amended at any Annual Meeting of the organization by a 2/3 vote of the members present. Provided such amendment has been first presented to the membership at least 30 days prior to said meeting. Any amendment to the Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the Annual Meeting at which it is adopted unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption on in the motion to adopt.

#### ARTICLE XI – PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

The rules of Cameo Generations, of the Board, and of the Annual or called Meeting, shall be governed by *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised*.

#### ARTICLE XII – GOVERNING RULES

Section 1. The Kansas Society Bylaws shall be the governing rules for Cameo Generations in all cases not specifically provided for by the Cameo Generations Bylaws.

Section 2. All personal expenses shall be the responsibility of the individual members.

#### ARTICLE XIII – STANDING RULES

- Attendance at Cameo Generations meetings is limited to Cameo Generations members and special guests of the Cameo Generation's President.
- 2. Cameo Generations will pay \$300 for travel expenses for the KSDAR Outstanding Junior for expenses at Continental Congress.
- 3. Cameo Generations will donate \$50 in memorial to the State Regent's project to honor deceased members.
- 4. Cameo Generations will donate \$50 yearly to the page fund for use at State Conference.
- 5. Cameo Generations will donate \$150 to the State Regent's project during the 3rd year of the current administrations' term.

Kansas Daughters sparkled with over 200 graduating from leadership and GEP courses in 2022. Mother's Day Boxes were assembled at the state conference for active military at Fort Riley valued over 5,500 dollars.

Workshops were developed by the special Torch Team, comprised of selective state officers and state chairs. The workshops were held in regional areas of the state, with specific attention to rural chapters that have weak broadband connections. Chapter regents, registrars, and treasurers were targeted with specific information related to their position and one-to-one assistance was given. Chapters volunteered over 130,000 service hours.

Laura Renfro, State Corresponding Secretary, represented the Kansas Society at the American Heritage awards ceremony to support three national winners from Kansas: Evelyn Cole Peters National Award-Photography, and Photography-B/W Enhanced, First Place, Addison Hinterweger, Prairie Flint Hills Chapter; Music-Instrumental, Third Place, Julie Crawford, Mary Draper Chapter; Literature & Drama-Fiction, First Place, Leslie Stair, Esther Lowrey Chapter.

Wednesday began for your state regent as a guest of the Mississippi and Alabama Daughters for the Southern Sunrise Breakfast. Many Kansas members assisted as Balcony Volunteers and attended various open houses and congress committee meetings. Laurie Barnes, State Chaplain was a host for the open house in the beautiful Kansas Chapel with a steady stream of visitors.

Kansas hosted the Golden West Tea with six other states, coordinated by the State Vice Regent Denise Bullock. Over one hundred seventy guests dined on Mexican fare among themed tables of A Road trip across Kansas, appointed with Sunflower arrangements. Pamela Wright President General was welcomed and brought a brief greeting for the members.

The Patriotism Luncheon celebrated and saluted support of service to our military and their families. Brigadier General Bonnie Bosler, United States Air Force brought the keynote address. She is the Mobilization Assistant to the AMC Command Surgeon, Air Mobility Command, Scott Air Force Base, Illinois.

Congress opened on Wednesday night and began with the United States Navy Band, and the entrance of the Vice President Generals, National Officers, and the sparkling President General Pamela Rouse Wright, led by the Pages with State Flags. As Kansas Daughter Susan Lee Metzger, Curator General, entered the hall, she received rousing cheers from the Kansas Daughters.

NSDAR awarded \$250,000 from the proceeds of Insignia sales for the 250th Anniversary of the Navy and Marine Corps celebration to culminate 2025.

In recognition of Marian Anderson's legacy, NSDAR provided \$150.000 to Marian Anderson's Museum for the preservation and restoration of Ms. Anderson's performance gowns. A new DAR Scholarship for studying music and performing arts was created from the new Mary Anderson Legacy Fund. Wednesday evening concluded with David Rencher from FamilySearch who gave a presentation and launched the "Relatives at DAR" experience connecting all DAR members.

Thursday morning's business session included the reports of the Executive Officers, recommendations from the National Board of Management, and Bylaw amendments. Special presentations were made by the American Heritage Committee and the Historian General. # CORPORATE CHARTER OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

FIRST: The Name of the corporation is the KANSAS SOCIETY of the NATIONAL SOCIETY of the DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION.

SECOND: The name and address of its Resident Agent in this State is Janet Lake, State Treasurer, 22603 W. 72nd St., Shawnee, KS 66227-2638

THIRD: This Corporation is organized NOT for profit, and the objects and purposes to be transacted and carried on are:

- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebration of all patriotic anniversaries.
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and according to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.
- (3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.
- (4) This corporation shall have power to receive title to real and personal property by gift, devise, bequest or purchase; to own, hold, sell, convey, lease and re-lease, let and sublet real and personal property; and to manage, invest, reinvest or disburse the funds that

may accrue from the holdings of such property in the manner provided by the Bylaws of the Kansas Society as now constituted or as hereafter amended. This corporation shall have the power to sue and to be sued.

No officer, director or member of this corporation shall be individually liable for the obligations of the corporation.

These articles may be amended by two-thirds vote, provided a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days prior to the Annual State Conference of the Kansas Society. This corporation shall have such other authority as may be provided in the Bylaws of the Kansas Society, not in contravention of the provisions of this Charter or the laws of the State of Kansas.

This corporation shall not have authority to issue capital stock.

FOURTH: The elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Board of Directors of this corporation and shall be the managers of the business of the corporation and shall hold, manage and control all property of the corporation.

The members of the Kansas Society and all persons who shall hereafter become members, who are in good standing under the Bylaws of said Society, shall be members of this corporation.

FIFTH: The term for which this corporation is to exist is ONE HUNDRED YEARS.

# BYLAWS OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Revised by the Ninety-third KSDAR Conference March 6, 1991 Amended 1992, 1993, 1994, 1995, 1996, 1999, 2000, 2003, 2005, 2006, 2007, 2009, 2010, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2021, 2022, 2023

#### **ARTICLE I - Name**

The name of this society shall be the Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, hereinafter referred to as KSDAR.

#### **ARTICLE II - Object**

The objects of this Society shall be to promote the objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, hereinafter referred to as the National Society.

- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries;
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens;
- (3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom; to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

#### **ARTICLE III - Members**

**Section 1. Membership.** The membership of the state society shall consist of the chapters in good standing of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution in the State of Kansas.

**Section 2. New Chapters.** The Recording Secretary shall enroll a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society as a member of the Kansas Society upon receipt of the following information from the chapter: name of the chapter; the date of its organization; the names of its officers and of its members. This notification shall cause the newly confirmed chapter to be enrolled as a member of the Kansas Society and to belong to a District according to its location.

#### ARTICLE IV - Fees and Dues

**Section 1. Annual Dues.** The annual state dues for each chapter shall be \$10.00 per member which shall be sent by the chapter treasurer and shall be postmarked no later than December 1. A chapter whose dues have not been paid before December 1 shall be notified by the state treasurer that the chapter shall not be entitled to representation at the state conference. The fiscal year of the Kansas Society shall be January 1 through December 31.

**Section 2. Dues.** Dues for a member admitted or reinstated on or after July 5 shall be credited for the upcoming dues year, which begins December 1

# Section 3. Additional Payments.

(a) Each year, the State Treasurer shall set aside from the annual state dues received from each chapter member five cents for the support of the Kansas State Society Children of the American Revolution. The KSDAR State Treasurer shall forward these funds to the K.S.C.A.R. Senior State Treasurer.

#### **ARTICLE V - Officers**

**Section 1. Officers.** The elected officers of the Kansas Society shall be a regent, a vice regent, a chaplain, recording secretary, a corresponding

secretary, organizing secretary, treasurer, a registrar, a historian, a librarian, and reporter.

# Section 2. Eligibility.

- (a) To be eligible for the office of State Regent or State Vice Regent, a member shall hold and have held membership in a chapter within Kansas for at least five (5) years prior to her election and have served a term as chapter regent. To be eligible for any other state office, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within the state of Kansas for at least two years.
- (b) A member holding two or more offices each carrying a vote at an annual state conference shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.
- (c) Any member seeking to serve as a State officer shall be a member in good standing from a Chapter in good standing and not in violation of NSDAR or KSDAR bylaws. (See Article XIII, Chapters, Section 1. Officers, paragraphs 2 and 3.)
- (d) No member, except the State Treasurer, shall be eligible to the same office for two successive terms, and no member who has served two terms in any state office shall be eligible to any other state office, except that of State Regent or State Vice Regent, until the expiration of at least one year. No member shall be eligible for any state office as a district officer elect.
- (e) A member having served more than one-half of a term in a state office shall be deemed to have served a term.
- **Section 3. Term.** The officers of the Kansas Society shall hold office for three years or until their successors are elected. The term of office shall begin no earlier than at the close of the Continental Congress at which the Regent and Vice Regent are confirmed.
- **Section 4. Expenses.** The expenses of the State Officers, as approved in the budget, shall be submitted as itemized statements in writing, with receipts, to the State Regent, who shall present them to the State Treasurer for authorized payment. Requests to be reimbursed for

additional expenses shall be submitted as itemized statements in writing, with receipts, to the Executive Committee for its action.

**Section 5. Vacancies.** If the office of State Regent becomes vacant, the State Vice Regent shall become State Regent automatically provided she has been confirmed as State Vice Regent.

Vacancies in other state offices shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee, with the approval of the State Board of Management, until the next regular meeting of the State Conference, when the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by the Kansas Society.

**Section 6. Automatic Resignation.** Any State Officer unable to carry out the duties of her office for a period of six months automatically relinquishes her position as a State Officer, unless ruled otherwise by the State Regent with the approval of the Executive Committee.

**Section 7. Honorary State Regent.** In recognition of valuable service to the Kansas Society, a member who has served as State Regent, upon her retirement from office, may be elected Honorary State Regent for life. Election shall be at State Conference and may be by voice vote. An Honorary State Regent is entitled to a vote at the State Conference.

#### **ARTICLE VI - Nominations and Elections**

**Section 1. Election.** The officers of the Kansas Society shall be elected at the State Conference every third year, coinciding with the year of election of National Executive Officers.

The election shall be by ballot unless there is but one nominee for each office, in which case, by general consent, the written ballot may be dispensed with and the vote for the entire ticket taken by voice. Should a written ballot be necessary, it shall be prepared by the chair of the Nominating Committee.

(a) **Nominations**. During an election year for KSDAR state officers the announcement of upcoming elections and call for chapters to consider proposing nominations to state office shall be published in the September issue of the Cyber Sunflower.

## **Section 2. Nominating Committee.**

(a) **Members.** The Nominating Committee shall be composed of five members. The chair and an alternate shall be elected at the Fall Forum State Board of Management meeting during the third year of each administration. Each District shall elect one committee member and an alternate at its annual District meeting which follows.

No member shall be eligible to serve on the Nominating Committee for consecutive terms.

(b) **Duties.** No later than one week after the nominating committee is elected, the chair of the nominating committee shall notify, by e-mail to the State Reporter and to all chapter regents, a reminder of the impending election and shall indicate where nominations are to be sent and the final date on which the names of members who consent to be considered for state offices shall be received from the chapters.

The notice shall also appear in the first regularly published issue of the Cyber Sunflower following the announcement.

- (c) The committee shall select one nominee for each office. In its selection of candidates, the committee shall endeavor to represent each of the four Districts.
- (d) A chapter may endorse more than one member for office. However, no chapter shall have more than one member serving as a State Officer at a time.
- (e) Any member desiring to be considered by the nominating committee for election to a state office must provide a fully executed chapter endorsement form, signed by the Chapter Regent and the Chapter Recording Secretary, and received by the chair of the nominating committee no later than December 15.
- (f) By January 15, the report of the Nominating Committee shall be sent to the State Officers, the Honorary State Regents, and

the Chapter Regents. The report of the Nominating Committee shall be presented at the State Conference. The same report shall appear in the first regularly published issue of the Cyber Sunflower immediately following the January 15th date.

(g) Nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the floor nominee has been obtained and the nominee has the fully executed chapter endorsement form signed by the chapter regent and the chapter recording secretary ready for immediate submission to the nominating committee chair.

**Section 3. Vice President General.** A candidate for Vice President General from Kansas shall be endorsed by a majority vote by ballot at a State Conference. No endorsement for Vice President General shall be made more than eighteen months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated in the motion.

**Section 4. Emergency Situations.** If an emergency situation is declared by the Executive Committee, then an anonymous vote conducted through the designated virtual service shall be deemed a ballot vote fulfilling any requirement in the bylaws or rules that a vote be conducted by ballot.

#### **ARTICLE VII - Duties of Officers**

**Section 1. General Duties.** The officers of the Kansas Society shall perform the duties prescribed by these bylaws, the Bylaws of the National Society and by its parliamentary authority.

Each State Officer shall prepare an annual report of less than 200 words: 10 days before the beginning of State Conference, one copy shall be sent to the State Regent and one copy to the State Recording Secretary. Reports may be submitted electronically. These annual reports shall be presented at the State Conference and shall be published in the *Annual Report and Proceedings*.

Within thirty days after Continental Congress, each retiring State Officer, with the exception of the State Recording Secretary, shall deliver to her successor a written procedure of the requirements of her office, a list of the KSDAR property in her custody, and all records and

property of the Kansas Society, and she shall obtain a receipt for these items. A duplicate of the list of the KSDAR property in custody shall be sent to the State Regent. The State Recording Secretary's deadline shall be September 1.

## Section 2. State Regent.

- (a) The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management, and the Executive Committee
- (b) She shall be the executive officer and shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society. She shall ensure compliance with KSDAR Bylaws and NSDAR rulings in accordance with NSDAR Bylaw Article XV, States, Section 10.
- (c) She shall appoint all committees except the Nominating Committee, naming the chair of each; shall be ex officio a member of all committees except the Nominating Committee;
- (d) shall appoint a State Parliamentarian;
- (e) shall sign checks and authorization for checks drawn on the Kansas Society accounts;
- (f) shall plan the schedule for the Fall Forum and shall plan and prepare the program for the State Conference.
- (g) Signature cards for all bank accounts shall bear her signature.
- (h) She shall receive from the State Officers and the State Committee Chairs all statements of expenses, as approved in the budget, and present them to the State Treasurer for authorized payment.
- (i) She shall send each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the State Chairs of the national committees and of any other appointees and shall notify the Chapter Regents of all changes in personnel and addresses of National and State Officers and appointees.

- (j) She shall notify the state recording secretary and state webmaster of the names and contact information for the chapter regents by August 1<sup>st</sup> for each year of her administration.
- (k) She shall endeavor to visit each chapter in the Kansas Society at least once during her term of office.
- (l) Prior to their publication, the State Regent shall approve the final copies of the "Kansas DAR News" and the KSDAR Annual Report and Proceedings.
- (m) The State Regent shall have the privilege of promoting a Patriotic, Historical, or Educational Project during her term of office.
- (n) The accumulated monies shall be deposited in a special fund designated by the State Regent. The allocated funds shall be limited to the actual cost of the project, except that Educational Projects shall be exempt from this rule. Should the original project of the State Regent be oversubscribed during her term of office, she shall have the privilege of specifying a state project to receive the oversubscription within ninety days of going out of office. No pledges or contributions to a State Regent's Project shall be dated later than the last day of her administration.

# **Section 3. State Vice Regent.**

- (a) In the absence or inability of the State Regent, the State Vice Regent shall perform the duties of the office of State Regent.
- (b) The State Vice Regent shall preside at the Chapter Regent's function at the State Conference.
- (c) In addition, she may prepare for the recognition of the Outstanding Chapter and Chapter Regent according to the established Guidelines.
- (d) She shall receive from the Chapter Regents their annual lists of names and email addresses of Chapter Chairs of state and

- national committees; she shall collate for each State Committee Chair a listing of the Chapter Chairs of her committee.
- (e) She shall receive from Chapter Regents their chapter yearbooks.
- (f) She shall perform any other duties designated to her by the State Regent.

#### Section 4. State Chaplain.

- (a) The State Chaplain shall open and close meetings of the Kansas Society with the reading of scripture and prayer and conduct such religious services as occasion may require.
- (b) She shall conduct a Memorial Service at each State Conference; she shall prepare a list of members who have died since the previous State Conference and shall provide that list to the State Registrar; she shall prepare the memorial program, including member tributes as necessary, and provide it in a printable format to the State Recording Secretary. Programs shall be made available to all attending the Memorial Service and included in the KSDAR Annual Report and Proceedings.
- (c) She shall prepare the Necrology Report each year and provide the list to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary. The Necrology Report shall be printed in the KSDAR Annual Report and Proceedings.
- (d) She shall provide the Report of Deceased DAR Member form for publication on the Kansas Society members only website.
- (e) She shall send notes of sympathy to the families of recently deceased members. She may send additional Sunshine Greetings to members on behalf of the State Society.
- (f) She shall be responsible for oversight and care of the Kansas Chapel at NSDAR to include: ensure annual updates to the Memorial Book are recorded; ensure sufficient inventory of information brochures are available; provide the NSDAR Beautification and Grounds Committee with required maintenance and repair needs; place a floral memorial in

memory of Mrs. Guernsey during Continental Congress; she may, at the request of the State Regent, host a reception in the Kansas Chapel during Continental Congress;

(g) and any other duties as directed by the State Regent.

## Section 5. State Recording Secretary.

- (a) The State Recording Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meetings of the Kansas Society, the State Board of Management, the Executive Committee, and the Finance Committee.
- (b) She shall notify State Officers, Chapter Regents and State Committee Chairs of any actions taken at these meetings affecting their duties.
- (c) She shall maintain the official membership roll of the State Board of Management.
- (d) She may cosign checks drawn on the Kansas Society accounts. She shall be a member of the Finance Committee.
- (e) Each year she shall maintain copies of the annual reports of State Officers, Chapter Regents, District Directors, and State Committee Chairs until published in the KSDAR Annual Report and Proceedings.
- (f) It shall be the duty of the State Recording Secretary to compile, edit and publish the *Annual Report and Proceedings* of the State Conference. A committee to assist with this duty may be selected by the State Recording Secretary. She shall provide to the State Regent, who presided at the State Conference, a final proof copy of the Proceedings prior to its publication.
- (g) She shall maintain a list of past State Officers.

## Section 6. State Corresponding Secretary.

(a) The State Corresponding Secretary shall maintain the official Kansas Society mailing list of the members who are to receive meeting notices, shall attend to all the correspondence of the

- Kansas Society, and shall assist the State Regent in her official correspondence.
- (b) She shall notify the State Officers and the delegates of any special meetings that may be called.
- (c) She shall send out notices of meetings of the State Board of Management at least thirty (30) days prior.
- (d) She shall send previous notice of proposed bylaws amendments to all chapter regents, voters, delegates, and alternates and post to the members' website no later than thirty (30) days before the state conference.
- (e) She shall prepare and distribute the official KSDAR stationery.
- (f) She shall assist in the preparation and distribution of award certificates.
- (g) She shall monitor changes in Chapter Officers as reported in emembership and send lists of the names and addresses of the current Chapter Regents to the KSDAR webmaster for posting on the KSDAR members' website and to the State Recording Secretary for publication in the KSDAR Annual Report and Proceedings.
- (h) Immediately after a State Conference at which an election is held, she shall send to each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the newly elected state officers.
- (i) Sixty days before the beginning of State Conference, she shall send the official call for the State Conference to the State Officers, the National Officers whose membership is in the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regents, the State Committee Chairs, and the District Directors.
- (j) Sixty days before the beginning of State Conference, she shall send each Chapter Regent one State Conference Credentials Form and one form for reporting chapter officers.

(k) She shall mail by October 1, any KSDAR Annual Report and Proceedings received from the State Recording Secretary to members specified in the Standing Rules and to the members who placed prepaid orders.

#### Section 7. State Organizing Secretary.

- (a) The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent and Chapter Organizing Regents in the organization of new chapters.
- (b) She shall be responsible for the correspondence related to the organization of a new chapter, and she shall notify the Executive Committee the following information about a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society: name and location, date of organization, names and addresses of its chapter officers and members, and chapter code number. This notification shall cause the newly confirmed chapter to be enrolled as a member of the Kansas Society and a District assignment shall be made.
- (c) She shall work with state chairs of Chapter Development and Revitalization and Membership to develop programs to assist existing chapters in membership recruitment and retention.

#### Section 8. State Treasurer.

- (a) The State Treasurer shall receive and take charge of all funds and securities of the Kansas Society.
- (b) She shall deposit them in the name of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution and
- (c) shall disburse these funds as directed by the State Board of Management or the State Conference.
- (d) The State Regent shall approve all expenditures.
- (e) Upon assuming the duties of her office, she may transfer the checking accounts to a convenient, federally insured banking institution, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee; this action shall be ratified at the next meeting of the State Board of Management.

- (f) Within three weeks after each state meeting, she shall receive from the State Meetings Treasurer an accounting of all expenses for the meeting, all registration monies, invoices, and other financial information. She shall ensure all approved bills have been paid and any excess funds deposited in the General Fund within six weeks of the meeting's close. She shall coordinate with the State Meetings Treasurer to provide a full accounting of income and expenses for the State Conference and Fall Forum to be printed in the KSDAR Annual Report and Proceedings. A full accounting of income and expenses for the State Conference and Fall Forum shall be printed in the KSDAR Annual Report and Proceedings.
- (g) She shall keep an itemized account of the receipts and expenditures, close the books on December 31, and submit them for audit to an audit committee.
- (h) She shall present the auditor's report annually.
- (i) She shall send the Kansas Society's annual report or a Form 990 to NSDAR.
- (j) She may serve as the chair of the Finance Committee. (See Article XI, Section 5.)
- (k) The State Regent may appoint an Assistant Treasurer. The Assistant Treasurer shall not serve on the Executive Committee but may be appointed to serve on the Finance Committee.
- (1) Prior to the State Conference, she shall report to the State Credentials Committee Chair the number of votes to which each chapter is entitled. After the delegates and alternates are elected, she shall verify their eligibility for the State Credentials Committee.
- (m) She shall be bonded, along with other listed state officers, Assistant Treasurer, the State Meetings Treasurer in a Signature Officers Bond; the fee to be paid by the Kansas Society.

- (n) She shall be the custodian of all bonds, securities, and other evidence of invested funds.
- (o) Signature cards for all bank accounts shall bear the signatures of the State Regent, State Treasurer, and State Recording Secretary.
- (p) She shall retain the audited accounts and the tax records of the Kansas Society for a period of six years and shall be responsible for their transfer to her successor at the close of the term.

#### Section 9. State Registrar.

- (a) She shall maintain a current mailing list and provide the mailing list for the "Kansas DAR News."
- (b) Following the monthly National Board of Management membership votes, she shall provide an updated mailing list to the State Regent, State Reporter, and State Chair of the Junior Membership Committee.
- (c) In coordination with the State Chairs of the Lineage Research and Volunteer Genealogists committees, she may assist chapters with genealogy research and preparation of membership applications.
- (d) She shall be an administrator of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution Facebook/Social Media Closed Group and will determine the membership status of women asking to join the group.

#### Section 10. State Historian.

- (a) The State Historian shall direct such historical work as may be required by the Kansas Society or suggested by the National Society.
- (b) She shall prepare and submit an annual report to the Historian General.
- (c) She shall keep a reference record and file of the State Historical Markers and Archives of the Kansas Society and, at the close of

her term, shall prepare a copy of the inventory to be published in the *Annual Report and Proceedings* and given to the following incoming officers: State Regent, State Vice Regent, and State Historian. She shall obtain two copies of the *Annual Report and Proceedings* to be placed in the KSDAR Archives.

- (d) At the close of the administration, she shall prepare a summary of the highlights of the past three years and the State Regent's biography to be published in the *Annual Report and Proceedings*.
- (e) She shall obtain a photograph of the KSDAR Outstanding Junior and the KSDAR Outstanding Chapter Regent, taken by the conference photographer at each state conference at the expense of the state society, for the purpose of maintaining a historical record. She shall provide a copy of each photograph to be placed in the KSDAR Archives.
- (f) She shall chair the Historical Markers and Archives Committee.
- (g) She shall promote and administer the state Outstanding Teacher of American History contest.

#### Section 11. State Librarian.

- (a) She shall list in her annual report all materials sent to the NSDAR Library and all those accepted from KSDAR chapters and members to the Wichita Public Library Advanced Learning Library. These lists shall be published in the *Annual Report and Proceedings* and will include the donor's name.
- (b) She shall serve as the KSDAR liaison with the Wichita Public Library Advanced Learning Library.
- (c) She shall have charge of receiving gifts, negotiating exchanges, and purchasing volumes for the Wichita Advanced Learning Library.

### Section 12. State Reporter.

(a) The State Reporter shall oversee the Kansas Society's Internet and related electronic publishing activity, including the "Kansas DAR News," *CyberSunflower*, Webmaster, websites, Volunteer Information Specialists and Public Relations and Media Committees:

- (b) and such other related duties requested by the State Regent.
- (c) She shall help maintain the distribution list for *CyberSunflower* and other correspondence.
- (d) She shall assist in monitoring the KSDAR Social Media accounts.
- (e) Along with the State Regent, she shall receive a final proof copy of each issue of the "Kansas DAR News" from its editor prior to its publication.

#### **ARTICLE VIII - Meetings**

**Section 1. Annual Meeting.** The annual meeting of the Kansas Society shall be known as the State Conference and shall be held in the Spring. The date and location of the State Conference shall be determined by the State Regent. The host District shall be determined by established rotation. The meeting shall be for the purpose of receiving reports of the State Officers, the State Board of Management, the Chapter Regents, the District Directors, and the State Chairs of all committees; the election of officers; and for any other business that may arise.

# **Section 2. Voting Members.** The voting members for state meetings shall be:

- (a) the elected state officers as provided in these bylaws;
- (b) the national officers and honorary national officers whose membership is within the state;
- (c) the Chapter Regent or in her absence the First Vice Regent or her alternate;
- (d) the elected delegates or alternates of each chapter of the state entitled to representation at the Continental Congress or special meeting of the National Society;
- (e) Honorary State Regents.

**Section 3. Qualifications.** Each chapter entitled to representation at the Continental Congress, in accordance with the Bylaws and Standing Rules of the National Society, shall be entitled to representation at the State Conference, provided that its members' state dues are credited to the State Treasurer by December 1 and its State Credentials Forms have been completed in accordance with these bylaws and it is a chapter in good standing, not in violation of NSDAR or KSDAR bylaws, (See Article XIII, Chapters, Section 1. Officers, paragraphs 2).

Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected by their respective chapters prior to sixty days before the beginning of State Conference each year and reported by forty-five days before the beginning of State Conference on State Credentials Forms (See Article XIII, Section 4(b), of these bylaws).

A delegate or an alternate shall have been a member of her chapter for one year immediately preceding the State Conference to which she is elected and shall be in good standing with the National and Kansas Societies at the time of her election, as verified by the State Treasurer.

The Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter may be a delegate.

# Section 4. Chapter Delegates and Alternates.

(a) The representation of a chapter at the State Conference or at any meeting of the Kansas Society during the year, beginning January 1, shall be based upon the number of members whose national and state dues for the current year have been paid by the December 1 preceding the State Conference, provided that the chapter meets the qualifications for representation in accordance with Section 3 of this Article. A member whose national and state dues are delinquent shall not be counted in determining representation at the meetings of the Kansas Society, shall not be entitled to vote for delegates or alternates to meetings of the Kansas Society, and shall not be entitled to act as representative or alternate at such meetings.

(b) The representation of a chapter at the State Conference or at any other meeting of the Kansas Society shall be as follows:

12 through 49 membersRegent and two delegates3votes50 through 199 membersRegent and five delegates6 votes200 through 299 membersRegent and eight delegates9 votes

(c) The number of alternates elected by a chapter shall not exceed twice the number of voters to which the chapter is entitled.

#### Section 5. Privileges.

- (a) Any member of the National Society who is a member in good standing of a chapter in the Kansas Society or a member-at-large residing in Kansas may attend the State Conference.
- (b) State Committee Chairs and District Directors who are not elected delegates shall have the privilege to speak without vote.

**Section 6. State Conference Registration.** Kansas members who attend any meeting or meal of the State Conference shall pay a registration fee, determined by the State Regent, not to exceed \$15.00. This fee shall be paid to the State Meetings Treasurer by the designated deadline. The registration fee shall be applied toward the expenses of the State Conference.

Section 7. Fall Forum. The date and location shall be determined by the State Regent. The plans for the Fall Forum shall be made by March 1, by the State Regent and State Vice Regent, in consultation with the host District Director. The host District shall be determined by established rotation. The meeting shall include the State Board of Management Meeting and may include the Annual District Meetings and functions for the purpose of education and leadership training for chapter regents, registrars, treasurers, and other interested members, as well as computer, genealogical and related workshops. The facility and other expenses of the Kansas Society's Fall Forum shall be allotted from the General Fund.

**Section 8. Fall Forum Registration.** Kansas members who attend any meeting or meal of the Fall Forum shall register and pay a fee not to exceed \$10.00 as determined by the State Regent. Reservation checks

for meals and any other payments associated with the Fall Forum shall be sent to the State Meetings Treasurer by the designated deadline.

**Section 9. State Meetings Chair and Treasurer.** A State Meetings Chair and a State Meetings Treasurer shall be appointed by the State Regent.

- (a) The State Meetings Chair shall be responsible for planning and coordinating the arrangements of the State Conference and Fall Forum under the supervision of the State Regent and in cooperation with the host District.
- (b) For the Fall Forum, the preparation and printing of the program shall be the responsibility of the State Meetings Chair.
- (c) For the State Conference, after consultation with the State Meetings Chair, the State Regent shall appoint the committees deemed necessary and the members to assist the Credentials Committee Chair.
- (d) The State Meetings Chair shall assign the various functions at the State Conference to the chapters in the host District and shall serve as an advisor for their plans.
- (e) Along with the State Regent, she shall sign on vouchers for payments of State Conference expenses.
- (f) For the Fall Forum, the State Meetings Chair shall serve as an advisor and work in collaboration with the State Regent, State Vice Regent, and the host District Director to assist with organizing the various functions and tasks.
- (g) The State Meetings Treasurer shall receive the registration fees, meal reservations, and any other payments for the state meetings, and shall forward the same to the State Treasurer.
- (h) She shall recommend the payment of the bills which have been authorized by vouchers bearing the signatures of the State Regent and the State Meetings Chair.

(i) She shall send a full accounting of income and expenses to the State Treasurer six weeks prior to the meeting's close.

**Section 10. Special Meetings.** Special meetings of the Kansas Society may be called by the State Regent and shall be called at the written request of five chapters. The purpose of the meeting shall be stated in the call. Except in cases of emergency, at least fifteen days' notice shall be given, and only the business specified in the call shall be transacted.

The delegates and alternates elected for the State Conference shall be the delegates and alternates for any special meeting of the Kansas Society, which may be held prior to the State Conference of the following year.

**Section 11. Emergency Situations.** In the case of a national, state, or local emergency, making meeting in person dangerous or impossible, the State Conference and/or the Fall Forum may be held in a virtual manner where all participants can hear each other at the same time (which may include electronic platforms).

The State Regent will call the meeting if the Executive Committee determines that an emergency situation exists. If possible, fifteen (15) days' notice shall be given.

The delegates and alternates elected for the State Conference shall be the delegates and alternates for any such designated meeting(s) of the Kansas Society, which may be held prior to the State Conference of the following year. Special Rules governing the meetings shall be adopted by the Executive Committee.

Any such rules adopted by the Executive Committee for the governance of such meetings shall supersede any conflicting rules in the parliamentary authority but may not otherwise conflict with or alter any rule or decision of the Society.

**Section 12. Quorum.** Twenty-five voting members, of which twenty shall be chapter representatives, shall constitute a quorum at the State Conference or any special meetings of the Kansas Society.

**Section 13. Proxy Voting.** There shall be no proxy voting at any state meeting.

## **ARTICLE IX - State Board of Management**

**Section 1. Members.** The State Board of Management shall consist of the elected State Officers, the National Officers whose membership is within the state, and each Chapter Regent in the state or, in her absence, the Chapter Vice Regent.

The Chair of each State Committee, District Directors, and Honorary State Regents may attend the meeting of the State Board of Management with voice but no vote.

**Section 2. Officers.** The Officers of the Kansas Society shall be the officers of the State Board of Management.

**Section 3. Meetings.** Regular meetings of the State Board of Management shall be held at the call of the State Regent, at least twice a year. One meeting shall be held during Fall Forum preceding the Annual District Meetings and the second meeting shall immediately precede the State Conference. Except in cases of emergency, at least thirty days' notice of the time and location of the meetings shall be given.

**Section 4. Authority.** The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Kansas Society during the interim between meetings of the State Conference, except that of modifying any action taken by a regular or special meeting of the Kansas Society.

### **Section 5. Duties.** The State Board of Management:

- (a) shall report annually to the State Conference;
- (b) shall ratify any decisions made by the Executive Committee;
- (c) and may make recommendations to the State Conference.
- (d) It shall approve any appointment made by the Executive Committee to fill a vacancy in a state office, except that of State Regent.

- (e) It shall assist the State Regent in ensuring compliance with NSDAR rulings in accordance with Article XV, States, Section 10.
- (f) It shall elect the chair and an alternate of the State Nominating Committee at the Fall Forum State Board of Management meeting in the third year of an administration.
- (g) It shall approve the budget submitted by the Finance Committee, shall ratify any transfer of funds by the State Treasurer, and shall consider any recommendations concerning the finances of the Kansas Society.

**Section 6. Special Meetings.** Special meetings may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of seven voting members of the Board. No business shall be transacted except that specified in the call, which shall be given at least fifteen days prior.

Section 7. Emergency Situations. In the case of a national, state, or local emergency, making meeting in person dangerous or impossible, the State Board of Management meeting(s) may be held in a virtual manner where all participants can hear each other at the same time (which may include electronic platforms). The State Regent will call the meeting if the Executive Committee determines that an emergency situation exists. If possible, fifteen (15) days' notice shall be given. Special Rules governing the meetings shall be adopted by the Executive Committee. Any such rules adopted by the Executive Committee for the governance of such meetings shall supersede any conflicting rules in the parliamentary authority but may not otherwise conflict with or alter any rule or decision of the Society.

**Section 8. Quorum.** Eleven members shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Board of Management.

**Section 9. Proxy Voting.** There shall be no proxy voting.

#### **ARTICLE X - Executive Committee**

**Section 1. Members.** The elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

**Section 2. Meetings.** The Executive Committee shall hold meetings prior to the regularly scheduled meetings of the State Board of Management, at the call of the State Regent, or upon the written request of three of its members.

Except in cases of emergency, at least ten days' notice shall be given.

**Section 3. Authority.** The Executive Committee shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society between the meetings of the State Board of Management.

The Executive Committee shall be subject to the orders of the State Conference, and none of its acts shall conflict with action taken by the Kansas Society.

#### **Section 4. Duties.** The duties of the Executive Committee shall be:

- (a) to transact business between meetings of the State Board of Management and to report all actions and recommendations to the next meeting of the State Board.
- (b) It shall approve the State Regent's standing and special committee appointments.
- (c) It shall declare a vacancy in any state office or committee for failure to perform stated duties;
- (d) shall rule on any exception to an automatic resignation of a State Officer;
- (e) shall fill any vacancy in a state office, except that of State Regent, subject to the approval of the State Board of Management.
- (f) It shall approve any transfer of funds made by the State Treasurer.
- (g) It shall receive and act upon requests for reimbursements of additional expenses submitted as itemized statements in writing, with receipts, by the State Officers and the State Committee Chairs.

- (h) It shall declare an emergency situation if meeting in person for any KSDAR meeting or conference is dangerous or impossible.
- (i) It shall adopt special rules for the governance and conduct of the meeting(s) which will be held in a virtual manner where all participants can hear each other at the same time (and may include electronic platforms).
- (j) The Executive Committee shall select meeting platform(s) that support anonymous voting and support visible displays identifying those participating, identifying those seeking recognitions to speak, showing (or permitting the retrieval of) the text of pending motions, telephone capabilities and showing the results of votes.

**Section 5. Emergency Business.** When necessary, the Executive Committee may conduct business by telephone or electronic communication where all participants can hear each other at the same time.

**Section 6. Quorum.** Seven members shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Executive Committee.

**Section 7. Proxy Voting.** There shall be no proxy voting.

#### **ARTICLE XI - Committees**

- **Section 1. Standing Committees.** The standing committees of the Kansas Society shall be Audit, Bylaws, Credentials, Finance, Investment, Kansas DAR News, Kansas DAR Scholarship, Resolutions and Historical Markers and Archives.
- **Section 2. Audit Committee.** Each administration, a committee of three qualified members shall be appointed by the State Regent for the purpose of examining the books and providing an annual audit report.
  - (a) The committee shall meet at least once to review the financial documents and prepare the annual audit report.

**Section 3. Bylaws Committee.** The Bylaws Committee shall be composed of a chair and four members, all appointed by the State Regent.

- (a) It shall be the duty of the Bylaws Committee to consider all properly submitted proposals for amendments and to present amendments and recommendations concerning the Bylaws to the State Conference for action.
- (b) Amendments and recommendations from the chapters, the Executive Committee, the State Board of Management, or the previous State Conference shall be presented to the committee ninety (90) days prior to the State Conference. (See Article XV, Section 1.)
- (c) The committee may have the right to edit proposed amendments and the right to originate amendments.
- (d) The Bylaws Committee shall forward prepared bylaws amendment proposals to the executive committee as requested for review. Prepared bylaws amendment proposals shall be submitted to the executive committee for final review no later than sixty (60) prior to State Conference
- (e) Previous notice of all proposed amendments from the Bylaws Committee shall be distributed by the State Corresponding Secretary.
- (f) The bylaws committee shall review the state bylaws for compliance with NSDAR bylaws and maintain updates of amendments from the National and State level.
- (g) The bylaws committee may be authorized to correct article and section designations, punctuation, and cross-references and to make other such technical and conforming changes as may be necessary, but do not alter the meaning or the intent of the society.

**Section 4. Credentials Committee.** The Credentials Committee Chair shall be appointed by the State Regent. She shall be assisted by members

of the host District for State Conference and shall be advised by the State Treasurer and the State Registrar.

- (a) It shall be the duty of the chair to supply the State Credentials Forms to the State Corresponding Secretary, to advise chapters of the number of delegates and alternates to which they are entitled and to receive their State Credentials Forms each year, electronically or, showing a Federal Postal Service or other carrier cancellation date no later than forty-five days before the beginning of State Conference.
- (b) She shall examine the returned forms and shall verify with the State Treasurer and State Registrar the eligibilities of the delegates and alternates listed.
- (c) She shall have charge of the registration and its committee at the State Conference and shall submit credentials reports to the assembly.
- (d) It shall be the duty of the Credentials Committee to have the responsibility for the proper identification and registration of the delegates and the alternates attending the State Conference.
- **Section 5. Finance Committee.** The Finance Committee shall be composed of the State Treasurer, who may serve as chair; the State First Vice Regent; the State Recording Secretary; and two members appointed by the State Regent.
  - (a) It shall be the duty of the Finance Committee to prepare an annual budget to be submitted to the State Board of Management at its meeting preceding the State Conference. The recommended budget shall be submitted to the State Conference for action
  - (b) The Finance Committee shall report any recommendations concerning the finances of the Kansas Society to the State Board of Management.
- **Section 6. Investment Committee**. The KSDAR Investment Committee shall be a standing, administrative committee, comprised of

three members appointed by the State Regent, at least one of whom shall be a member of the Finance Committee and whose oversight shall be the Executive Committee.

- (a) The KSDAR Investment Committee shall define investment objectives for approval by the Executive Committee and execute strategies toward achieving those objectives.
- (b) No member shall serve more than two consecutive terms.

**Section 7. Kansas DAR News.** The Chair of the Kansas DAR News Committee shall be the editor of the "Kansas DAR News".

- (a) She shall prepare the newsletter and oversee its printing.
- (b) She shall provide to the State Regent a final proof copy of each issue of the "Kansas DAR News" prior to its publication.
- (c) The mailing list is provided by the State Registrar.

# **Section 8. Kansas DAR Scholarship Committee.** The Kansas DAR Scholarship Committee:

- (a) shall be composed of a chair and two members, all appointed by the State Regent.
- (b) It shall be the duty of the Kansas DAR Scholarship Committee to select the recipients of the Kansas DAR Scholarship, the Judd Smith Brooks Scholarship, and the Elizabeth M. Hill Kessler Scholarship from the eligible applicants.
- (c) Funds for the Kansas DAR Scholarship and the Kansas DAR Good Citizens Scholarship are provided from interest on designated investments.
- (d) The committee shall follow the guidelines set forth in the section concerning Scholarships.

**Section 9. Resolutions Committee.** The Resolutions Committee shall be the Corresponding Secretary. The courtesy resolution shall be prepared and presented by the Resolutions Committee.

# **Section 10. Historical Markers and Archives Committee.** The Historical Markers and Archives Committee:

- (a) shall be chaired by the State Historian and composed of one representative from each district that shall be appointed by the State Regent.
- (b) The committee is to establish guidelines for the care of the markers and monuments that have been placed by the State Society, which includes markers placed by disbanded chapters, and future markers placed by KSDAR.
- (c) An established schedule shall be prepared to ensure physical checks for necessary repairs and maintenance of the markers, with written recommendations made to the Executive Committee.
- (d) A digital file will be maintained to assist in recognition of each marker with an accompanying history.
- (e) The committee will determine what should be held as part of the KSDAR Archives. Guidelines will mirror the NSDAR Archival Processing Manual and references to the Society of American Archivists.

# **Section 11. Other Committees.** Such other committees, standing or special:

- (a) shall be appointed by the State Regent as the Kansas Society may authorize or as the National Society may require.
- (b) The State Regent shall be ex officio a member of all committees except the Nominating Committee.
- **Section 12. Committee Appointments.** Appointments of committee chairs and members shall be concurrent with the term of the appointing State Regent.
- **Section 13. Expenses.** State Committee chairs shall receive prior authorization from the State Regent for any expense for which they plan to seek reimbursement. Approved expenses shall be submitted as

itemized statements in writing, with receipts, to the State Regent, who shall present them to the State Treasurer for authorized payment.

## Section 14. Reports. Each State Committee Chair:

- (a) shall prepare an annual report of less than 200 words. 10 days before the beginning of State Conference, one copy shall be sent to the State Regent and one copy to the State Recording Secretary. Reports may be submitted electronically. These annual reports shall be presented at the State conference and shall be published in the *Annual Report and Proceedings*.
- (b) Each State Committee Chair shall prepare and send by the designated deadline a report to the Vice Chair of the South-Central Division of her committee. A copy of this report shall be sent to the State Regent.

**Section 15. Transfer of Records and Property.** At the completion of her term, each State Committee Chair shall deliver to the State Regent or, if so instructed, to the newly appointed State Chair of her committee:

- (a) a written procedure of the requirements of her chair position;
- (b) a list of the KSDAR property in her custody;
- (c) and all records and property of the Kansas Society;
- (d) and she shall obtain a receipt for these items.
- (e) She shall provide a duplicate of the list of the KSDAR property in her custody for the State Regent.

**Section 16. Electronic Meetings.** Committees of the Kansas Society are authorized to hold virtual meetings via electronic platforms in which all committee members can hear each other at the same time and have access to the materials being discussed. Each committee will develop its own rules governing these meetings so long as the rights of the members are protected.

**Section 17. Proxy Voting.** There shall be no proxy voting.

#### **ARTICLE XII - Districts**

**Section 1. Names.** The Kansas Society shall be divided into four Districts: The Northeast District, the Northwest District, the Southeast District, and the Southwest District. The chapters in each District are designated in the Standing Rules.

**Section 2. Jurisdiction.** The four Districts are under the jurisdiction of the Kansas Society. Each District shall have the privilege to allow for any traditional procedures and courtesies, provided that they shall not conflict with the Bylaws and Standing Rules of the National and Kansas Societies.

District officers shall be responsible for complying with NSDAR directives in regard to their District's finances. (See Article VII, Section 8, Paragraph 10.)

## Section 3. Meetings.

- (a) The meetings of the Districts shall be held for the general purpose of expanding the programs of the National and Kansas Societies, to provide instruction and inspiration to chapter members, and to acquaint them with the State Officers and the State Committee Chair. The District Directors shall work with the State Regent in planning the District Meetings.
- (b) The Annual District Meetings shall be held during Fall Forum, following the State Board of Management, for the purpose of receiving the reports of its officers and conducting the business of the District. In the second year of an administration, each District shall elect a District Nominating Committee, and in the third year of an administration, each district shall elect a member and an alternate to represent the district on the State Nominating Committee. Results of these elections shall be submitted to the State Recording Secretary within one week after the conclusion of the Fall Forum. District officers shall be elected at the Annual District Meeting during the third year of an administration. The schedule for the meetings shall be published in the "Kansas DAR News."
- (c) Electronic Meetings. Districts of the Kansas Society are authorized to hold virtual meetings via electronic platforms in which all members can hear each other at the same time and

have access to the materials being discussed. Each district will develop its own rules governing these meetings so long as the rights of the members are protected.

(d) Minutes of the meetings and any changes to the District Guidelines shall be submitted to the State Recording Secretary by October 1.

**Section 4. Officers.** The officers shall be a Director, an Assistant Director, and a Secretary-Treasurer. Officers shall be elected for a term of three years at the Annual District Meeting preceding the election of the State Officers and shall assume the duties of their office at the close of the State Conference at which the State Officers are elected. No member shall be eligible to succeed herself in the same District office. A member may serve consecutive terms in the three offices of her District; such consecutive service shall be limited to three terms.

**Section 5. State Conference.** The Districts shall host the State Conference by rotation in the following order: The Northwest District, the Northeast District, the Southeast District, and the Southwest District. If necessary, the rotation order may be altered. The chapters in the host District shall be assigned responsibilities for the State Conference by the State Conference Chair.

### **ARTICLE XIII - Chapters**

**Section 1. Officers.** The chapters shall elect their officers by February 1 of the year in which they elect officers. Newly elected chapter officers shall assume the duties of their offices after they are installed.

The chapter officers reported to the National Society and recognized for the transaction of business with the National Society shall be the Regent, the First Vice Regent, the Recording Secretary, the Treasurer, and the Registrar. Each chapter shall have these five officers, and no member shall hold two of these offices, except in chapters with thirty (30) or fewer members. No one member in any chapter shall hold the office of chapter regent, chapter recording secretary and chapter treasurer at the same time. (See NSDAR Bylaws, Article XIII, Chapters, Section 6 (a)).

A chapter may elect such additional officers as it deems necessary and is authorized to adopt bylaws and rules for the transaction of business provided that they do not conflict with the Bylaws of the National Society or of the state organization. (See NSDAR Bylaws, Article XIII, Chapters, Section 6 (d)).

Section 2. Chapter Officer Report Forms. Each year before April 1, the Chapter Regent shall report the names and addresses of the chapter officers for the ensuing year. This report shall be made on forms from the office of the Organizing Secretary General, Chapter Services, which are furnished to the chapters by the State Corresponding Secretary or may be printed electronically from the NSDAR Members' Web Site and shall include the names and addresses of all chapter officers whether newly elected or completing the term of election; the date of election; the date on which office is assumed; and the length of term. The completed form shall be returned to the State Organizing Secretary and the Organizing Secretary General by the April 1 deadline. The forms may be submitted electronically.

Section 3. Provision for Fees and Dues in Chapter Bylaws. A chapter may provide in its bylaws for fees and dues for chapter use in addition to national and state dues but may not levy assessments in excess of the requirements of its bylaws. The bylaws of a chapter shall prescribe a date for collection of chapter dues sufficiently in advance to meet the requirements for payment to the National and Kansas Societies before December 1.

# Section 4. Representation and Return of Credentials Forms.

(a) Delegates and alternates to the Continental Congress shall be elected on or before the first day of the second month preceding the month of Continental Congress of each year. Using blanks furnished by the National Society, the name of the Chapter Regent and First Vice Regent and a list of the delegates and alternates shall be sent to the chair of the Credentials Committee and to the State Regent, bearing a postmark no later than the 15<sup>th</sup> day of the second month preceding the month of Continental Congress.

Only a chapter member in good standing, whose credentials have been completed in accordance with the Standing Rules of

the National Society, shall be eligible to represent her chapter at meetings of the National Society. (See National Bylaws, Article VIII, Section 2(e).

(b) Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected prior to sixty days before the beginning of State Conference of each year. (For number and qualifications of delegates and alternates to State Conference, see Article VIII, Section 3 and 4 of these bylaws.) The name of the Chapter Regent and Vice Regent and a list of the delegates and alternates and the date of their election shall be printed on the State credentials Form, which is furnished to the chapter by the Kansas Society in a mailing from the State Corresponding Secretary and shall be photocopied and sent to the State Registrar, the State Treasurer, and the State Credentials Committee Chair forty-five days before the beginning of State Conference.

Only a chapter member in good standing with the National and Kansas Societies, whose state credentials have been completed in accordance with these bylaws, shall be eligible to represent her chapter at meetings of the Kansas Society.

**Section 5. Chapter Regent.** Annually, before September 1, each Chapter Regent shall send to the State Vice Regent a listing of names and e-mail addresses of her chapter's chairs of national and state committees.

The Chapter Regent is responsible for completing and returning by the stated deadlines the copies of the chapter credentials forms after the election on or before February 1 of the chapter representatives to the Continental Congress and the State Conference.

Each Chapter Regent shall prepare an annual report of less than 200 words: 10 days before the beginning of the State Conference, one copy shall be sent to the State Regent and one copy to the State Recording Secretary. Reports may be submitted electronically. These annual reports shall be published in the *Annual Report and Proceedings*.

**Section 6. Chapter Chaplain.** The Chapter Chaplain shall report deaths immediately to the State Chaplain. Information about the deceased

member shall include her name and national number, date of death, name and address of next of kin, and any offices held in the chapter or in the State and National Societies.

#### Section 7. Chapter Treasurer.

- (a) Each year the Chapter Treasurer shall remit to the Office of the Organizing Secretary General the annual national dues of \$45.00 per chapter member, payable to the Treasurer General NSDAR, showing a Federal Postal Service, or other carrier, cancellation date no later than December 1. With the remittance of fees and dues to the National Society prior to the December 1 deadline the Chapter Treasurer shall include the chapter dues computer printout furnished by the Office of the Organizing Secretary General.
- (b) For each remittance of fees and dues to the National Society after December 1 the Chapter Treasurer shall include a remittance form listing the members with their national numbers to whom payment should be credited. Remittance Blanks may be ordered free of charge from the Office of the Organizing Secretary General or printed electronically from the NSDAR Member's Web Site.
- (c) Each year the Chapter Treasurer shall remit to the State Treasurer the annual state dues of \$10 per chapter member, payable to Kansas Society DAR, showing a Federal Postal Service, or other carrier, cancellation date no later than December 1.
- (d) Only a member whose state dues have been paid by December 1 shall be eligible to serve as a delegate or an alternate at the State Conference.
- (e) Each year by November 15, the Chapter Treasurer shall also send to the State Treasurer all chapter contributions for the National Society and the Kansas Society, including the required payments designated in the KSDAR Standing Rules, accompanied by the State Treasurer's Remittance Form.
- (f) Only payments received by the State Treasurer postmarked by the November 15 deadline will be processed for that year's

- reporting period; payments "postmarked" after November 15 will be applied to the succeeding calendar year.
- (g) The state deadline of November 15 is necessary to ensure payments are provided to NSDAR before their posted deadline.
- (h) All Checks remitted to the Kansas Society shall be made payable to the Kansas Society DAR.
- (i) The Chapter Treasurer shall report all changes in membership as they occur to her Chapter Registrar.
- (j) Each year following the end of the fiscal year the Chapter Treasurer shall submit to the State Treasurer the chapter's annual financial report by the March 1 deadline.
- (k) Each year following the end of the fiscal year the Chapter Treasurer shall file the appropriate version of the 990 Form with the Internal Revenue Service.
- (l) She shall notify the State Treasurer of the filing's completion by April 1.

### Section 8. Chapter Registrar.

- (a) The Chapter Registrar shall report to the Organizing Secretary General, in writing, all changes in membership, marriages, divorces, deaths, resignations, transfers, and changes of address as they occur (Bylaws of the National Society, Article XIII, Section 10).
- (b) These reports of membership changes shall be made on Membership Change Forms and directed to the Office of the Organizing Secretary General, Membership Office. Membership Change Forms may be obtained from the Membership Office.
- (c) The Chapter Registrar shall report all changes in membership, in writing, to the State Registrar. She shall report all information necessary for the State Registrar to keep her records exact.

- (d) Changes in membership by admission, transfer, resignation, removal for nonpayment of dues, reinstatement, death, marriage or divorce, and changes of name or address shall be reported on State Registrar's Report Forms.
- (e) Information about newly admitted members shall include full name, including maiden name, and if married, husband's full name; full date of admittance; national number; name of chapter; name and rank of ancestor, with the name of the child through whom the lineage is traced; and colony, or state.
- (f) Information about members transferring into the Kansas Society from out of state shall include, in addition to the information required for newly admitted members, the name and location of former chapters and dates of transfers.

#### **ARTICLE XIV - Compliance**

**Compliance.** In accordance with NSDAR bylaws, Article XV, States, Section 10., compliance by Kansas Society members and chapters to NSDAR rulings will be ensured by the State Regent and the State Board of Management.

- (a) **Members.** Any KSDAR member seeking to serve in an office or on a committee at the State or District level, must meet any bylaws qualifications and must also be a member in good standing and from a Chapter in good standing.
- (b) **Chapters.** Any KSDAR chapter seeking to submit a KSDAR bylaw amendment proposal, nominate a chapter member for state office, or to be represented at State Conference with delegates must be in good standing; that is non-violation of NSDAR rulings. (See NSDAR Bylaws Article XIII, Chapters, Section 6., paragraph (a)).

## **ARTICLE XV - Parliamentary Authority**

The rules contained in the current edition of *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised* shall govern this organization in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the bylaws,

standing rules, or rulings of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, these bylaws, or any special rules of order the organization may adopt.

#### **ARTICLE XVI - Amendments of Bylaws**

**Section 1. Notice.** These bylaws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of those voting at any annual State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days prior to the State Conference, and that the amendment has been proposed by the State Bylaws committee, the State Board of Management, the previous State Conference, or by a chapter of the Kansas Society in good standing and not in violation of NSDAR or State Bylaws. (See Article XIII, Chapters, Section 1. Officers, paragraphs 2 and 3.)

**Section 2. Effective.** Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt, an amendment shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is adopted.

**Section 3. Mandatory Amendments.** Any amendment to the bylaws of the National Society shall become the law of the state without further notice.

#### **ARTICLE XVII - Dissolution**

Although the period of duration of the state organization is perpetual, if for any reason the state organization is to be dissolved or otherwise terminated, no part of the property of the state organization or any of the proceeds shall be distributed to or inure to the benefit of any of the officers or members of the state organization. Upon the dissolution of the state organization, assets shall be distributed by the Board of Management and/or the Executive Committee to and only to the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution.

#### STANDING RULES

#### Revised by the Ninety-second KSDAR Conference March 17, 1990

Amended 1992, 1993, 1995, 1996, 1997, 1999, 2000, 2001, 2002, 2003, 2005, 2006, 2010, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2019, 2021, 2022, 2023

**Number 1.** The report of the Kansas Society shall be known as the *Annual Report and Proceedings* of the Annual State Conference of the Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The report shall be made available by the Recording Secretary in either an electronic or hard copy as follows: State Regent, State Officers, Chapters, Honorary State Regents, State Chairs of National and State Committees, District Directors, the Kansas Society DAR Archives in the Wichita Public Library Advanced Learning Library (two (2) copies), the Historian General and the Kansas State Historical Society. Chapter Regents may receive a free hard copy by special request made before June 1. Other members desiring copies may place a request for a hard copy by June 1 with the Recording Secretary with a prepaid order for costs per copy.

**Number 2.** At least two issues of the "Kansas DAR News" shall be published each year and sent to each member. For those members with known email addresses, the newsletter will be sent electronically. For those members without a known email address, the newsletter will be sent through the United States Postal Service. The printing and mailing expenses shall be borne by the state society. *The Cyber Sunflower* shall be published and distributed electronically each month.

**Number 3.** The sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) shall be allowed to the State Regent each year for expenses incurred while fulfilling the responsibilities of her work in addition to office expenses. This amount is to be paid quarterly in one thousand two hundred fifty-dollar (\$1,250) increments. The sum of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500) shall be allowed to the State Regent if she completes the NSDAR School Tour during the first year of the new NSDAR Administration.

**Number 4.** Twenty-five dollars (\$25) shall be allowed to each State Officer to partially defray her State Conference expenses.

**Number 5.** Forty dollars (\$40) shall be allowed for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas State Regent at Continental Congress; and forty dollars (\$40) shall be allowed for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas State Regent-elect; arrangements shall be made by the State Treasurer.

**Number 6.** Fifty dollars (\$50) shall be allotted to the State Regent for Kansas Pages at Continental Congress.

**Number 7.** Funds budgeted for membership development workshops approved by the State Regent shall be used for presentation materials, a master workshop packet, room rental fee not to exceed one hundred fifty dollars (\$150.00), IRS volunteer mileage submitted with odometer readings, and turnpike tolls for the workshop leaders per year.

**Number 8.** Each year, the State Treasurer shall set aside from the General Fund one dollar (\$1) per chapter member for the State Conference expenses. Any money remaining after the expenses of the State Conference are paid shall be returned to the General Fund of the Kansas Society.

**Number 9.** Each chapter will pay five dollars (\$5) per year toward the cost of Web hosting for the KSDAR Web site.

**Number 10.** The money from the Historic Markers Fund shall be put in short term Certificates of Deposits at the best rate available in an FDIC-insured bank or savings institution, with interest to be deposited back to the original funds.

**Number 11**. As Certificates of Deposits held by KSDAR mature and are considered for renewal, the State Treasurer shall investigate bank ratings and transfer those funds to other FDIC-insured institutions to diversify funds and reduce potential risk of exceeding the FDIC limit at one banking institution.

**Number 12.** Annually, names of deceased members will be entered into the Memorial Book in the Kansas Chapel at NSDAR Headquarters. Non-KSDAR names may be placed in the Memorial Book for a fee of ten dollars (\$10).

**Number 13.** Each year, on or before September 1st, each chapter shall provide electronic or hard copies of its chapter yearbook to the State Vice Regent for distribution to the State Officers, the Director of its District, the State Parliamentarian, and the State Chair of the Membership Committee.

**Number 14.** The State Regent, State Vice Regent, and Historian shall have the custody of the Kansas Society DAR Archives which is located in the Wichita Public Library Advanced Learning Library and shall at the end of their term give a list of the contents of the file to the incoming Regent, to the Vice Regent, and to the Historian. No one shall have access except in the presence of one of these three officers.

**Number 15.** The State Regent may send a report of the October National Board Meeting to each chapter of the Kansas Society.

**Number 16.** The State Regent's Pin and jeweled insignia shall be self-insured for replacement cost by the State Society.

**Number 17.** The Library Collection and Archives Fund shall support the Kansas DAR Library Collection and Archives. Monies contributed to the Fund shall be under the jurisdiction of the State Treasurer.

**Number 18.** At the Conference Opening, the State Regent shall appoint a committee to approve the minutes of the State Conference.

**Number 19.** The hospitality of the following persons, if attending the Fall Forum or the State Conference at the official invitation of the State Regent, shall be a meeting expense: Candidates for the office of President General, NSDAR; National Executive Officers or National Appointees appearing as speakers; two members of the National Board of Management; representatives of the DAR schools, Approved Schools and Indian Schools; or any other designated speaker for a Special program or event.

**Number 20.** The Registration Fee shall be waived for members serving as state meetings Pages.

#### Number 21.

(a) A ten-dollar (\$10) limit shall be placed on awards at the State Conference given by each committee chair or state officer.

(b) Interest accrued annually from the Mary Lempenau Permanent Trust of seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750) shall pay monetary awards at the State Conference.

**Number 22.** The Kansas State Outstanding Junior shall be awarded one hundred fifty dollars (\$150) if she attends Continental Congress, to be paid from the general fund.

**Number 23.** Each national winner sponsored by a Kansas chapter who attends Continental Congress to receive their award shall be reimbursed two hundred fifty dollars (\$250) for transportation expenses. The reimbursement shall be from the General Fund.

**Number 24.** The Kansas Society shall present to the State Regent an Ex-State Regent's Pin or, if she has been elected Honorary State Regent, an Honorary State Regent's Pin at the end of her term of office, providing that she served two-thirds of her elected term. The pin shall be ordered by the State Treasurer and presented by the State Vice Regent.

**Number 25.** An Honorary State Regent who becomes a candidate for national office shall be extended the courtesy of one full-page, black-and-white advertisement in the *DAR Magazine*; donations from Districts, chapters, and individuals may be solicited, but the Kansas Society shall be responsible for any remaining balance of the expense of the advertisement to be paid from the general fund. The candidate shall be responsible for, and bear the expense of, the preparation of the advertisement for publication.

**Number 26.** A pilgrimage to a historically significant Kansas site may be held annually. Local chapters may act as hostesses. A sum not to exceed fifty dollars (\$50) shall be allotted to the committee in charge of the pilgrimage.

**Number 27.** The chapters in each District are as follows:

**NORTHWEST** - Abilene, Arthur Barrett, Courtney-Spalding, Desire Tobey Sears, Good-Land, John Athey, Jonathan Gilbert, Mary Wade Strother, Nathan Edson, Polly Ogden, Sarah Steward, Smoky Hill.

**SOUTHEAST** - Cofachique, Council Oak, Emporia, Esther Lowrey, Four Winds, General Edward Hand, Isabella Weldin, Jane Dean Coffey, Marais des Cygnes, Molly Foster Berry, Oceanus Hopkins, Susannah French Putney, Where the Trail Divides.

**SOUTHWEST** - Cimarron River Valley, Dodge City, Eunice Sterling, Flores del Sol, Fort Larned, Kanza, Little Arkansas, Martha Loving Ferrell, Martha Vail, Mary Draper, Newton, Randolph Loving, Uvedale, Wichita, William Wilson.

**Number 28.** The chapters of the host district shall contribute an amount set by the Executive Committee, not to exceed fifteen dollars (\$15). These monies are to be paid to the State Treasurer, to be used for decorations, table favors, hospitality and/or door prizes at both state meetings. Surplus funds will be sent to the State General Fund.

#### **Number 29.** Friendship Fund:

- (a) Available to all KSDAR chapters for members who are no longer able to pay dues. Only two awards will be issued per year, with no more than one per chapter. No member may use the fund more than once.
- (b) Request is made by the Chapter Regent to the State Treasurer if there are no chapter funds available to cover the dues. Request must be submitted to the State Treasurer no later than November 1.
- (c) If more than two applications are received in one year, the State Treasurer and one member of the Finance Committee will randomly select the two recipients to present to the Finance Committee. The Finance Committee will approve via email, ratifying the vote at the next committee meeting.
- (d) If approved, a check for the national dues (not the chapter dues) will be sent to the chapter. The state dues will be transferred from the Friendship Fund to the State General Fund.

**Number 30.** Scholarships (Revised by the KSDAR Executive Committee March 12, 2003, 2005, 2015, Revised by the 123rd KSDAR State Conference, April 24, 2021)

- (a) The Genevieve Pendleton Memorial Endowment Scholarship shall be given in the third year of each KSDAR administration to a high school senior who is entering a two or four-year college or university. The selection shall be based on an essay relative to the broad aspect of national defense, the patriotic awareness of the candidate, two references as to the applicant's character and integrity, and an acceptable academic record. Selection shall be made by the State Scholarship Committee Chair, the State National Defense Committee Chair, and the State Regent. The Scholarship started in 1980-1981 with the original amount of \$2,100.00.
- (b) The Elizabeth M. Hill Kessler Scholarship shall provide a college scholarship for a girl graduating from high school. The recipient of this scholarship shall have acceptable scholastic ability, show financial need, be a citizen of the United States of America and be eligible for membership in the DAR. The Kansas DAR Scholarship Committee shall select the recipient. The Scholarship started in 1985-1986 with the original amount of \$2,515.41. The Elizabeth M. Hill Kessler Scholarship will be closed after the remaining principal balance plus interest is paid out in equal amounts over three years. The established criteria for presenting the award should be followed according to the original intent of the grantor.
- (c) The Gladys E. Routh Memorial Scholarship, in memory of her parents, Albert Jesse Jones and Mabel Clare Early Jones, shall be awarded to a deserving boy or girl, preferably one who is at least ¼ Pottawatomie Indian. If a deserving individual of Pottawatomie heritage is not available, another Indian heritage may be substituted. The scholarship winner must attend an accredited college or university. Members of the scholarship committee who will supervise the awarding of the scholarship shall consist of the KSDAR Scholarship Committee Chair, the KSDAR American Indians Committee Chair and a member of the Eunice Sterling Chapter. This Scholarship started in 1987-1988 with the original amount of \$3,000.00. The Gladys E.

Routh Memorial Scholarship fund will be closed after the remaining balance plus interest is paid out in equal amounts over three years. The Kansas State Scholarship Committee may establish and cooperate with the Scholarship Director of the Prairie Band Potawatomi Nation Tribe in Mayetta, Kansas, to identify a qualified student, male or female, who meets the established criteria of the scholarship consistent with the intent of the original grantor of the scholarship.

- (d) A Kansas DAR Scholarship shall be awarded annually to a high school student who has DAR eligibility or is a member of DAR. Proof of enrollment in a two or four-year accredited college or university shall be required. Members of the state DAR Scholarship Committee shall select the recipient.
- (e) A Good Citizen scholarship shall be awarded annually following the rules set forth by the NSDAR National Good Citizen Scholarship Committee.
- (f) The Judd Smith Brooks Scholarship shall be awarded annually to a male senior high school student who is a descendant of a proven DAR line. The scholarship will be funded by the State Regent's Project of Brenda Dooley with one thousand dollars (\$1,000) to be awarded each year until all funds (dollars raised and interest) have been expended. Proof of enrollment in a two or four-year accredited college or university shall be required. Members of the state DAR Scholarship Committee shall select the recipient.
- (g) In the event that no applications are received for the scholarships offered during any year of the term, applications will be accepted for those scholarships the following year in addition to those regularly scheduled to be awarded.
- (h) Special Scholarships.

**Number 31.** At any State Conference, these rules may be adopted or suspended by a majority vote and may be amended by a majority vote with notice, or a two-thirds vote without notice.
