Margaret Hill McCarter was a 20th century educator, novelist and orator. In 1894, she founded Western Sorosis, a women's club. She was a suffragette believing that women's rights could best be expressed through the ballot. Mrs. McCarter became the best known and highest paid novelist in Kansas for her time. Anna Laura Hill, NSDAR #177749 was proud of her 5 Revolutionary War Patriots and was a member of the Chemung Chapter, NSDAR, Elmira, New York from 1922 until her death in 1963.

The Woman's Christian Temperance Union purchased the Carrie Nation House in Medicine Lodge that was declared a National Historic Landmark in 1976.

Nichols was an early advocate for women's rights. While fulfilling the traditional roles of wife, mother, and homemaker, and often supporting her family by her superlative skills as a needlewoman, she researched and wrote about the injustices done to women by laws governing property, contracts, inheritance, and domestic relations. She gained a wide audience as a journalist and speaker in Vermont and throughout the East. In 1854 she decided to move with her family to the Kansas Territory in order to influence the laws of the soon-to-be state to provide more equal treatment of women. When the Kansas Territory was drafting a proposed constitution in 1859, she successfully advocated for provisions that would ease women's legal disabilities. She was also a dedicated abolitionist and supported the Kansas free-state cause. She lived for several years in the free-state port town of Quindaro, Kansas, where she assisted runaway slaves.

Georgia Greenleaf, 1885-1970, was a social work pioneer. She received an A.B. Degree in Public Administration from Missouri University. She attended New York School of Social Work, Ohio State University, and University of Chicago. In Chicago, she worked with Hull House co-founder Jane Addams and Secretary for the Southern Tier Children's Home, Elmira, New York. Her responsibilities in Missouri included: Superintendent of Public Welfare in LaClede, Children Placing Agent for Missouri State Board of Charities, Methodist Orphans Home Association in Saint Louis, and a Children's Aid Society Resident placing Agent for Missouri. She dedicated her life to the well-being of children. Since Georgia Greenleaf was a Resident Agent in Missouri for the Children's Aid Society of New York City which was connected to the Orphan Train movement, the Nathan Edson Chapter presented the award at the 21st Annual Celebration of Orphan Train Riders in Concordia, Kansas.
